Editor's Preface

The Bowker Annual is published in cooperation with the Council of National Library Associations and attempts to reflect the trends and activities in the preceding year in the library and book trade arenas. This edition — the twelfth in sequence — includes reports on the following topics for the first time: the Growing Market for Library Materials; the Status of Library Statistics of National Scope; the new Standards for Public Library Service and the Standards for Library Service to the Blind; on recent library legislation and federal appropriations for the purchase of library materials; on the new Federal Library Advisory Groups; on Adult Book Reading in the United States.

Part Two, The Associations Section, again includes latest possible information on national, state, regional, provincial, foreign, and international library associations, joint committees, and an index of activities of the various committees, boards, sections, and specialized associations. This Activities Index, an undertaking which is original to this publication, is prepared each year to encourage and facilitate cooperation among the various library groups which are active in the same fields.

The Library Services Branch of the Office of Education, has been extremely cooperative in supplying various statistics gathered by that agency; and Dr. Frank L. Schick, Director of the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee Library School, has continued to be of great assistance in reporting and interpreting statistics. In addition, many library and book trade authorities have been good enough to supply data on specific subjects, and their names are mentioned in connection with the articles involved.

Willis E. Wright, who for seven years was co-editor of *The Bowker Annual* and responsible for compilation of the Associations Section, has again served as consulting editor of the book. In this capacity his constant guidance in the planning and execution of the *Annual* has been of immeasurable help.

Suggestions for new topics to be covered and comments on data printed in this edition, whether favorable or critical, will be appreciated. It is the continuing aim of the editor, the CNLA, and the publishers to make this compendium of information fill a basic need in library and book trade literature.

Statistics of Public Libraries

PUBLIC LIBRARIES AND COORDINATION — 1966*

Coordination, not among public libraries alone, but among all types of libraries, appeared a dominant theme in 1966. Contributory to the need for working together were a multiplicity of relatively new Federal programs and sharply increasing costs of education. Expenses of all schools during the decade (1955–1965) rose from \$20.5 billion to \$44.8 billion. Public library operations experienced a similar rise.

All city governments in the United States (but not by any means the totality of governments operating public libraries) increased their operating expenditure for library purposes from \$185 million in 1960 to \$267 million in 1965.¹ This 45 per cent increase in operating expenditures for public libraries corresponds to the trend of educational expenditures by being significantly higher than the 36 per cent rise for general municipal expenditures during the same period² (see Table 1).

In 1965, the last full reporting year, the share of municipal expenditures allocated to library purposes varied considerably by size of municipality. In 1965, cities of the 50,000 to 99,999 class devoted the largest share of their expenditures to library purposes, 2.70 per cent, while the metropolises allocated the smallest share of municipal expenditures, 1.74 per cent (see Table 2).

These increasing municipal expenditures for public libraries as experienced in the past six years provide evidence of

a public commitment to library service but do not tell us the share that rising costs have contributed to enlarged outlays.

In 1962, the composite index of costs of public library service was 117.0 (see Table 3). In 1965, by the most recent reporting figures, the index had reached 128.8. That is, to obtain the same goods and services that were obtained by public libraries in 1958 for one hundred dollars these agencies needed to spend \$128.80 in 1965.

In 1962, the Library Services Branch studied the statistics of 26 of the larger public libraries in the United States to ascertain initial trends in the decades of the 1960's. Now at midpoint in the decade, a similar set of operating statistics for the same agencies provides some trend data for these libraries serving populations of 500,000 or more (see Tables 4 and 6).

In comparing the 1965 operating data with those for 1962 one must be aware that population figures for both sets of data are those collected in the Census of 1960. That is, the farther the collection of data is in time from the decennial census the more skewness results from a changing population not reflected in the figures. However, we may argue from past experience that the population of these central cities is probably not subject to such changes as are suburban areas.

Seventeen per cent of the public with public library service available in 1965 is within the municipal boundaries of these cities. As a group their per capita

School Library Statistics

CURRENT ACTIVITIES IN SCHOOL LIBRARIES

With the first funds appropriated under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, the past year has been one of the most, if not the most, significant years in the development of school libraries in the United States. The last national statistics on public school libraries in the Nation, for the 1962-63 school year, indicated that 41 per cent of public schools, chiefly elementary, did not have centralized school libraries. Expenditures, and staffing of libraries in the schools with school libraries were far below the standards of the American Association of School Librarians. ESEA has begun a dramatic change in this situation, as the next report from the Office of Education will undoubtedly show.

Title II, while helping to improve collections in those schools with the greatest relative need for materials, chiefly elementary schools, has served, in many States, as a stimulus for establishing school libraries in schools which formerly did not have them. Maryland's state plan for Title II, for example, provided special incentive grants to schools which developed plans to establish a centralized school library. Such grants have encouraged many school systems to begin school library services where there were none before. Several State plans have also included special grants for purchase of materials to assist in developing demonstration school libraries as models for other systems to emulate. Maryland, New York, and North Carolina are among the states which report demonstrations of exemplary school library programs financed, in part, with Title II funds.

Title I of the same Act may well have an equally profound effect on school library development, since under its provisions it is possible to secure not only

materials, but also personnel and equipment. No firm National figures on the amount of Title I money spent for school libraries are available, but preliminary reports indicate that it may be even larger than under Title II. In many States, school systems which qualify for Title I funds have employed librarians, library aides, and library clerks in the target schools. Title I projects have provided for establishing some school libraries, such as an elementary school library in Bellingham, Washington, described at the program meeting of the AASL. Other projects have enabled schools to improve school libraries to levels of collection, staff, and services appropriate to good support of instruction.

A significant aspect of many projects initiated under both Titles I and II is their indebtedness to the demonstration of school library service at the levels of national standards exemplified by the project schools of the Knapp School Libraries Project of the AASL (see page 142). If the purpose of the Knapp Project is to show the contribution of good school library service to instruction, then the number of demonstrations emulating the Knapp schools which States have developed under Federal programs demonstrates its success.

The Knapp School Libraries Project, supported by a large grant from the Knapp Foundation of New York City, was developed to demonstrate school library service at the level recommended in *Standards for School Library Programs*, issued in 1960 by the American Association of School Librarians. Now in its fourth year, the project has initiated demonstrations in eight schools, each of which has worked in cooperation with a nearby teacher education institution, and has is-

College and University Library Statistics

COLLEGE AND UNIVERSITY LIBRARY STATISTICS AND LEGISLATION: REVIEW AND REPORT

Part I: Legislation

Perhaps the most significant publication for major academic libraries during 1966 was Allan Cartter's *An Assessment of Quality in Graduate Education*. And for two reasons. First, the discussion concerning the "measurement" of quality contains ideas which university librarians can use with profit when trying to measure the "quality" of their libraries. For example, in reviewing so called objective measures of quality, Cartter states:

"On reflection, however, it is evident that they are for the most part 'subjective' measures once removed. Distinguished fellows, Nobel laureates, and National Academy members are selected by peer groups on the basis of subjective assessments, faculty salaries are determined by someone's subjective appraisal, and endowments are the result of philanthropic judgments.

Number of volumes in the library, though more readily quantifiable, is a factor of little value in measuring institutional resources unless one can make a qualitative judgment about the adequacy of the holdings."¹

Will the ACRL committee on standards please note.

Second, Cartter's emphasis on the high correlation between effective graduate programs and library resources. He points out:

"A few universities with poor library resources have achieved considerable strength in several departments, in some cases because laboratory facilities may be more important in a particular field

than the library, and in other cases because the universities are located close to other great library collections such as the Library of Congress and the New York Public Library. But institutions that are strong in all areas invariably have major national research libraries. The 17 universities among the first 20 institutions in our study (omitting the three leading institutions of science or technology) had total library holdings ranging from 1.3 million to nearly eight million volumes; the average holding was 2.7 million volumes. The bottom 20 institutions among the 106 in the survey had libraries ranging from 125,000 to one million volumes, averaging 465,000."²

Perhaps another item to keep in mind is Cartter's observation regarding Federal aid:

"Since the current tendency in Federal aid is to increase the number of institutions which are strong centers of graduate education rather than to expand support for already outstanding institutions, such an evaluation of present strengths may be viewed with greater objectivity. (At least one major university has spent considerable time recently trying to convince a Federal agency that it is not one of the top twenty universities in the country and thus is eligible for support as a 'university of promise')."³

Speaking of Federal aid it is encouraging to note that appropriations for programs of concern to academic libraries were increased over previous fiscal years

ACADEMIC LIBRARY CONSTRUCTION

Significant Federal financial assistance continues to colleges and universities for help in building or improving libraries in the States and outlying areas under the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963 (Public Law 88-204, as amended). There were over 280 construction projects during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1966 for new libraries or for additions to or rehabilitation of existing libraries. Projects were under three titles: Title I — Grants for undergraduate facilities; Title II — Grants for graduate facilities; and

Title III — Loans for academic facilities. The largest grant made under the program for library construction during the fiscal year — \$3.4 million — went to the University of Chicago. An analysis of a September 30, 1966 status report of college facilities loans under Title III of the Higher Education Facilities Act showed that of the 191 applications for construction loans as of that date, 57 requests included library construction or improvement.

Statistics of Special Libraries

THE ROLE OF SPECIAL LIBRARIES IN THE UNITED STATES

Number of Special Libraries

The best reference published regarding the number of special libraries is Dr. Anthony T. Kruzas' *Statistical Report on Special Library Resources in the United States*,¹ which is based on data collected in 1961-62. Dr. Kruzas listed 2,163 company libraries, 1,221 government agency libraries, and 2,560 libraries operated by other organizations, which makes a total of nearly 6,000 special libraries and information centers.²

Estimates are not easy. The derived results of the number of special libraries can vary depending upon the definition of "special" used in the initial survey. Cooperation of librarians is also a factor. For example, Dr. Kruzas listed 298 special libraries serving state governments, which included departmental libraries within the state library agencies. The Office of Education, using a narrower definition of "special" in the Survey of Special Libraries Serving State Governments and having better cooperation from heads of the state library agencies, found nearly 450 special libraries.

Number of Professional Positions

The present membership of SLA is just over 6,300, including special librarians employed by college, university, and public libraries. Only 3,633 out of 6,000 libraries surveyed by Dr. Kruzas reported

a total of 7,672 on their professional staffs. It is doubtful that this information was reported in terms of full-time equivalents.

The Office of Education estimates that prior to 1963 there were under 10,000 professional librarians in special libraries. More recent data from the U.S. Civil Service Commission and tentative results of a Survey of Special Libraries Serving State Governments have raised that number to 12,000 professional librarians now employed in special libraries in the United States.

SLA's Goals for 1970 state: "At least 30,000 well-trained special librarians and information specialists should be working in the field by 1970." Based on these figures, over 18,000 new special librarians are needed to meet the goal. This is more than double the present number.

Library Resources

By projecting data available from Dr. Kruzas' study, U.S. Office of Education estimates, and budget estimates derived from a study by the SLA Professional Standards Committee,³ we are now able to derive some comparative figures of library resources.

The Office of Education tables show that there were 228,000,000 volumes in college and university libraries in 1964, over 20,000,000 volumes in centralized school libraries in 1963, and over 161,-

LIBRARY AND BOOK TRADE INFORMATION

THE BIBLIOGRAPHIC SYSTEMS CENTER

The Bibliographic Systems Center at the School of Library Science of Western Reserve University maintains a unique collection of systems for the intellectual organization of the information resources to be found in all types of graphic records in a large number of subject fields.

An important contribution to the Center's holdings was made by the Special Libraries Association in 1966, when it donated to the School the entire collection of the Special Classifications Center through which the Association had provided specialized services to the library profession for over 40 years. For ten of those years, the School managed the SLA Loan Collection of Classification Schemes and Subject Heading Lists (which became the Classifications Center in 1963) under the direction of the SLA Special Classifications Committee, assuming major responsibility for the acquisition of materials and for their effective control and use. For more than two years the Classi-

fications Center was supported by the National Science Foundation, under a grant which made possible the purchase of materials and thus the building of a strong collection of increased coverage in depth.

The more than 1,200 titles contributed by SLA have been merged into the School's own collection in classification and related fields, and the lending activity which was such an important part of the Association's service is being continued. Most materials are available on four-week loan, and limited numbers of pages will be photocopied (at cost) upon request. The Center is open from 9 to 5 five days a week, and visitors are welcome to make use of the collection for any research or other scholarly purpose. Library Standards

LIBRARY SERVICE FOR THE BLIND AND VISUALLY HANDICAPPED

Library service to the blind and visually handicapped is one of the seven specific service areas for which standards were developed and published by COMSTAC (The Commission of Standards and Accreditation for the Blind, established in 1963). The standards derive from the objective that library service for the blind and visually handicapped should be as encompassing as for the sighted. The standards pertain to the federal level of service, state and regional libraries, community libraries, school libraries, and libraries of agencies serving the blind. They cover staff, library materials, services, operating procedures, cooperative relationships, equipment, and physical facilities.

The cost of providing library materials to the blind and visually handicapped averages five to seven times the cost of providing the same level of service to sighted people. Some of the factors accounting for this higher cost are the greater cost of the materials themselves when compared to that of the average book; the necessity of providing materials in several forms (braille, large type, and records); and the amount of the librarian's time required to provide sufficient guidance and service to the blind person.

Responsibility for library services for the blind rests firstly in the Division for the Blind of the Library of Congress, which implements the word and intent of Congress; secondly in the state governments, acting through their designated agencies responsible for public and school library service; and thirdly in the community.

COMSTAC based its standards on a number of principles which define a na-

tionwide program of service to blind and visually handicapped readers. Since the low density of blind populations (about 500,000 legally blind and another half million with severe visual handicaps) requires a broader base of support and service than that which may suffice for sighted readers, the larger units of government — federal, regional, and state — play an essential role in support and provision of library resources for the blind and visually handicapped. However, the responsibility does not end at these levels. The library agency which serves any community, school, college, business, profession or other group in which a blind person functions should be prepared, within reasonable limits, to see that the needs of the blind members of the group are served as well as those of the sighted members. Adequate library service to blind and visually handicapped readers is possible only if all libraries are linked into an integrated system specifically designed to bring together these readers and special library materials for their reading needs. Library service for the blind and visually handicapped involves all the basic principles and objectives that apply to library service for sighted people, plus whatever additional steps are necessary to compensate for the handicapping effects of blindness. Bibliographic devices comparable to those available to the sighted reader must be developed and widely distributed so that library resources for the blind can be readily located wherever they are needed. Communication and duplication facilities suited to the blind must be developed and used to make resources quickly and conveniently accessible over wide areas. Special attention must be given to the services and tools

Legislation of Library and Book Trade Interest

FEDERAL LEGISLATION

As if confirming its name for posterity — “the Education Congress” — in its second session, the 89th Congress spent a major part of the time reviewing, amending and extending legislation to improve the quality of education, including library service.

Praising past performance and encouraging continuing advances, President Johnson added his support both in his budget requests and education message, recommending extension and funding of school, college and library programs. In recommending continuation of the Library Services and Construction Act, he said:

“Those who do not read are not much better off than those who cannot read. More than 100 million Americans have inadequate public library services. More than 15 million have none at all.

“A library must be a living institution with trained staff and funds to obtain new books, periodicals, films, records and other material.

“As the boundaries of learning are pushed back, our need for storehouses of knowledge grows greater. They offer man his link with the past and his vision of the future.

“Most public libraries in the United States are poorly equipped to perform this vital role.”

LSCA Amendments of 1966

Extension and expansion of the Library Services and Construction Act (P.L. 88-269), due to expire June 30, 1966, was one of the principal achievements in the area of library programs. The legislation, first introduced January 18, 1966, and eventually sponsored in various forms by

57 Senators and 24 Representatives, was reported (H.R. 1474) and passed by the House 336 to 2 on June 2, and then by the Senate (H.R. 1291) in a different form June 22, by voice vote. On June 28, the House agreed by unanimous consent to concur in the Senate version, clearing it for the President, who signed the measure into law July 19 (P.L. 89-511), authorizing the following:

Title I — Public Library Services

Authorization: \$35 million for FY 1967; \$45 million, FY 1968; \$55 million, FY 1969; \$65 million, FY 1970; and \$75 million, FY 1971.

As in the present Act, matching-grant funds may be used for books and other library materials, library equipment, salaries and other operating expenses. The minimum State allotment which must be matched would remain at \$100,000 for each of the States, Puerto Rico, and the District of Columbia, and \$25,000 each for American Samoa, The Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands, Guam, and the Virgin Islands. The floor year is updated from 1963 to the second preceding fiscal year.

In the case of all titles, the State library administrative agency is responsible for drawing up and submitting the required plans for library development and specialized State library services suited to the needs of the State and local communities.

Title II — Public Library Construction

Authorization: \$40 million for FY 1967; \$50 million, FY 1968; \$60 million, FY 1969; \$70 million, FY 1970; and \$80 million, FY 1971.

The basic allotment remains at \$80,000 for each of the States, Puerto Rico, and the District of Columbia, and \$20,000 each for American Samoa, the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands, Guam, and

Documentation

THE CURRENT SITUATION IN DOCUMENTATION

A quiet coalescence of the professional groups in documentation has been progressing slowly for a number of years. This year the growing unity of interest was particularly noticeable, not only among the authors of publications but also among the participants at the various congresses and conferences. The avenue through which an individual happened to approach his current specialization in the information sciences no longer has the significance it once did.

This inevitable development encompasses the working professionals, but it has by no means settled the question of how to train the next generation of workers who have not yet entered the field. Opinions on education for the information sciences seem to run the gamut from pure library school training to no library education at all. So far the conferences on education for documentation have produced little more than collections of uncoordinated papers, each one arguing that future training should more or less parallel that of the writer himself. Such chauvinistic tendencies are not surprising. After all, when a man has spent years acquiring education and experience in a particular field it becomes difficult for him to believe that anyone lacking similar preparation could function very effectively in that field.

Consequently we have the librarian arguing that training in the principles of library science is fundamental to all documentation activity and that other considerations are merely natural extensions of library practice. On the other hand the computer specialist feels that data processing knowledge is of paramount importance and that library processing is just another application for him to absorb on

the job. Meanwhile users who have entered documentation in their roles as reformers are plunking for courses in linguistics, electronics, semantics, mathematics, logic or whatever else they happen to consider particularly significant to the total effort in documentation.

As you read through statements by spokesmen for various countries you realize that this lack of certainty about educational programs is common. There are special schools and special courses everywhere. There are library schools embracing non-library subjects with special courses and there are library schools adhering to the old curricula. In the United States, despite the existence of special schools and programs, there seems to be a stronger trend toward expansion of the traditional library schools to envelop courses appropriate to emerging practices in the field.

All of this is not so much a matter of controversy as it is a reflection of quite natural indecision about how to prepare students for a field of endeavor which is undergoing some rapid evolutionary changes. Under conditions like these prognostication is difficult. However, it does seem safe to say that education for the information sciences will eventually contain all of the elements which all of the various propounders want it to contain. Whether these expanded educational programs are offered by special schools or whether they grow out of the present library schools may simply become an administrative question for each university to decide on a local basis. It will probably take a number of years for the whole thing to settle down to any stable pattern. As far as the past year is concerned, though, two observations can be made.

THE NATIONAL LIBRARY WEEK PROGRAM

During April 16-22, 1967, the National Library Week Program will mark the tenth anniversary of its continuing, year-round campaign for reading and library development. With the dual themes "Explore Inner Space—Read" and "Reading is What's Happening," the program will focus on total community access to reading for information and personal renewal, from the neighborhood (especially in poverty areas) to the most sophisticated research centers. The recruitment, education and effective use of librarians are continuing areas of emphasis.

The NLW program "for a better-read, better-informed America" is sponsored by the National Book Committee, a non-profit educational group, in cooperation with the American Library Association. Observed in all fifty states, the annual "Week" is both the climax and the inauguration of many year-round efforts to encourage Americans to read more and to stimulate widespread public support for libraries of all kinds. At least sixty-five national organizations and all arms of the communications industry actively participate in the program.

Launched in 1958 as the first nationwide citizens' movement to create interest in libraries and reading, the "Week" was observed March 16-22 and succeeded in arousing widespread personal concern for the status of reading opportunities throughout the country. The repeat of the program in 1959 followed a careful study of the preceding year's experience and firmly demonstrated increased public acceptance of NLW's fundamental objectives. It not only focused unprecedented attention on reading and library services but was the rallying point for a year's well-organized effort by thousands of professional and civic leaders who had set their sights on

specific goals. After the 1959 program, the American Library Association endorsed its continuation through 1962.

The impact of the third NLW set new records in every area. A primary factor in its success related to the operation of the program: it was the first year that NLW was considered neither a one-time event nor a single repetition of a first-year success. Specific goals were identified and everyone concerned more fully realized that the "Week" was not an end in itself but rather was a springboard for year-round implementation of reading and library development goals.

Following the 1960 program, independent evaluations were conducted by committees of the ALA and the National Book Committee. As a result, both groups decided to continue National Library Week through 1967.

The climate for progress produced by NLW's continuity and viability was amply reflected in succeeding years. Each program has further helped to identify libraries as vital agencies of education and to link reading with lifetime learning and opportunity. Reading itself has become an increasingly popular subject for discussion in all media year-round. In most states, NLW has been the occasion of the community's first keen look at its total library resources and has served as the impetus for broad-gauged constructive "action programs" to implement ALA national standards and bring about long-sought achievements: increased library circulation and registration, growth in tax support for libraries, improved patterns of school-public library cooperation, greater attention to academic library needs and to the contributions which special libraries make to economic progress.

Library Education

LIBRARY EDUCATION REPORT

Since the appearance of the *Library Education Directory 1964-65*, at least 25 additional programs have been established in the United States making a total of about 350 programs. Of these 35 are accredited by the American Library Association. (See page 289)

Degrees

According to the U.S. Office of Education *Summary Report on Bachelor's and Higher Degrees Conferred During the Year 1964-65* (OE-54010-65, Washington, 1966), the number of library science degrees awarded during the year 1964-65 reached an all-time high of 3,846 (Table 1). Of these, 623 were baccalaureate degrees (49 to men, 574 to women); 3,211 were degrees requiring 5 or more years but less than the doctorate (787 to men, 2,424 to women), and 12 were doctorates (11 to men, 1 to a woman).

As shown in Table 2, the percentage of

women was slightly lower than in the previous year but remains quite close to the seventy-fifth percentile.

In a study entitled *Doctor's Degrees Conferred by U.S. Institutions: By State, By Institution, and By Field, 1955-56 Through 1964-65*, (Washington, 1966), John L. Chase, Chief of the Planning and Reports Staff of the Division of Graduate Programs, Bureau of Higher Education, reported library science as the only subject area showing a decrease in doctorates awarded in 1964-65. The per cent of increase for all fields is 85 per cent. Library science, on the other hand, shows a decrease of 20 per cent. The seriousness of the degree gap at the doctoral level becomes apparent in view of the estimate by colleges and universities that they will need to more than double the number of library science faculty members in the next five years.¹

How Books Are Bound

The following article, adapted from an article in *SCHOOL LIBRARY JOURNAL* (November 1956), is a basic introduction to book binding, taking the reader step-by-step through the operation, from signature to finished book. Binding terms are defined, processes are explained, and materials are described.

BOOKBINDING is too basically simple a process to warrant the confusion that attends many discussions of it. Break it down into its elements and the mystery disappears. Learn how books are sewed—and you can identify almost any binding at sight.

All books start pretty much as shown at the foot of this page. Here 16 pages are printed on each side of a large sheet of paper, and the sheet is then folded down to a 32-page *signature*. Many a picture book consists of just one such signature, sewed, trimmed, and pasted into what binders call a *case* and laymen call a *cover*.

SADDLE-SEWING

Open to the center of a saddle-sewn picture book and you will see a line of stitching running down the inside fold. The stitching goes through to the outside fold of the signature. You could open a signature to the center and sew it in this way on your own Singer if you adjusted for a coarse stitch. In fact, very similar Singer sewing machines are used in binderies, with only the addition of a "saddle" shaped like a peaked roof to help position the folded signature as it passes under the needle. This method of *saddle-sewing with thread* is preferred in book work over

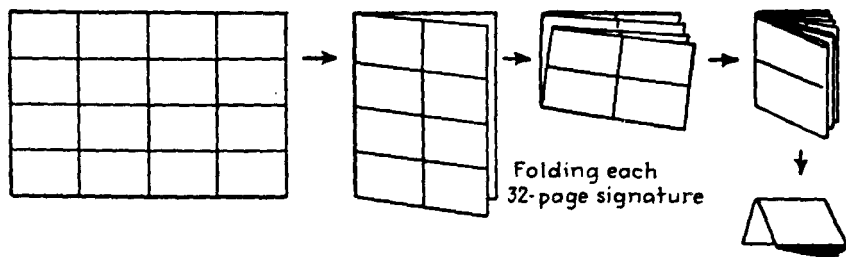
saddle-stitching with wire staples as used in magazines like *TIME*, etc.

SIDE-SEWING

Open a side-sewn book, such as a *Wonder Book*, and you will notice that it will not open all the way to the fold. The stitching goes through the pages from front to back about $\frac{1}{4}$ inch from the fold. You could do this kind of side-sewing on your own Singer, too, sewing alongside the fold with the signature closed instead of through the fold with the signature open as in saddle-sewing.

There are really only these two methods of securing a single signature. Saddle-sewing produces a flat-opening signature, and is preferred by many on that ground. Side-sewing, however, produces a stronger job. Often the *trade edition* of a picture book will be saddle-sewed, and the same publisher's *reinforced library edition* will be side-sewed.

In general the stitching in saddle-sewed books, being exposed and not being glued or secured, more readily works loose or gets pulled loose than the concealed stitching in side-sewn books. Furthermore, when the outside pages in a saddle-sewed book are pasted down inside the covers, the inner pages are held by only a single line
