Item No. I CONFIRMATION OF THE MINUTES OF THE
26TH MEETING OF THE ACADEMIC COUNCIL
HELD ON 12TH AND 13TH MAY, 1986.

The Minutes of the 26th meeting of the
Academic Council held on 12th and 13th May, 1986, may be
confirmed, as no comments were received from the members.

(i) Creation of a School of Library and Information Sciences -

The Head, Department of Library and Information Sciences proposed vide his letter Annexure- P that a separate School of Library and Information Sciences may be created for the healthy development of the Department, Library and other Information Departments. The Committee set up by the Academic Council recommended earlier for creation of a School of Library and Information Sciences vide its report at Annexure - Q . The report of the Committee was considered by the Academic Council in its 23rd meeting and on the its recommendation, the Executive Council in its 45th meeting held on 27th June, 1985 approved the creation of Schools and assignments of Departments. The Academic Council and the Executive Council did not approve of the creation of a separate School of Library and Information Sciences, though the Committee, which examined the re-organisation of Schools, recommended it. The assignment of Departments to various Schools may be seen at Annexure - R.

The proposal of the Librarian was placed before the 41st meeting of the Deans' Committee held on the 11th August, 1986. The Committee, after careful consideration, felt that it would be desirable to establish a separate School of Library and Information Sciences and resolved to support the recommendation made earlier by the Committee constituted by the Academic Council to consider re-organisation of Schools. The Committee resolved to recommend for consideration of the Academic Council.

The matter is placed before the Academic Council for favour of its consideration.

The Academic Council constituted a committee in 1984 on Re-organisation of Schools under the chairmanship of Prof. D. P. Singh, PVC, Mizoram Campus. The other members of the committee were as follows:-

The Committee recommended a School of Library & Information Sciences. However, the Academic Council resolved to put the Department of Library & Information Sciences under the School of Economics & Management. The irony of the situation is that even this School of Economics & Management is still in papers. As such the position of the department with regards to the School is ambiguous.

I still feel that the placing of the Department under the School of Economics & Management is not judicious. The matter needs reconsideration.

I shall feel highly obliged if the matter could be reconsidered and a separate School of Library & Information Sciences could be created for the healthy development of the Department, Library and the other information departments coming under the school.

(iii) Assignment of the Centre of Applied Statistics to the School of Physical Sciences -

The Head, Centre for Applied Statistics vide his letter at Annexure - I proposed that the Centre may be assigned to the School of Physical Sciences. The Academic Council in its 23rd meeting and the Executive Council in its 45th meeting, while considering re-organisation of Schools and assignment of various Departments, resolved to allocate the Centre for Applied Statistics to the School of Economics and Management Studies. The School of Economics and Management Studies is yet to be established by the University.

The matter was considered by the Deans' Committee in its 41st meeting held on the 11th August, 1986 and it resolved to recommend to the Academic Council to assign the Centre to the School of Physical Sciences with a condition that its services may be made available to all Departments and Schools of the University, as Statistics finds application in the Life Sciences, Physical Sciences, Social Sciences, Environmental Sciences and Education.

Sir,

In terms of his letter No. NEHU/VCF 18-1/84-2066 dated 6 August 1986, I was informed by the then Vice-Chancellor that the Centre for Applied Statistics would function as a part of the School of Social Sciences of the University and that it would be transferred to the School of Economics and Management Studies when the same would come into being. However, I should point out that Statistics plays vis-a-vis the sciences a role similar to that of Mathematics and finds application not only in Economics and Management Science but also in the other social sciences as well as the physical sciences, the life sciences and subjects like geography and education. As such, it would appear more logical, and functionally more appropriate, to place the Centre for Applied Statistics under the School of Physical Sciences (that includes the Department of Mathematics) or, may be, under a School of Mathematical Sciences that may be established to comprise the Department of Mathematics, the Computer Centre, the Centre for School Mathematics as well as the Centre for Applied Statistics.

I would request you to kindly place the matter before the next meeting of the Academic Council.

(i) Regulations on External Research Projects -

The Draft Regulations on External Research Projects were placed before the 26th meeting of the Academic Council for consideration. The Council resolved to call for the comments of the Departments first in it. The two Heads of Departments of Physics and Economics have forwarded revised draft Regulations on External Research Projects and they are placed at Annexures - VII and VIII respectively for consideration of the Council.

Proposal from the Deptt. of Physics, NEHU.Proposed Regulations on External Research Projects

1. These regulations may be called 'Regulations on External Research Projects'.
2. All research projects which may be funded by organisations other than the North-Eastern Hill University shall be called 'External Research Projects'.
3. A teacher desirous of seeking financial support from an external organisation will prepare the project as per the requirements of the organisation concerned.
4. The project duly forwarded by the Head of the Department and the Registrar, will be sent to the funding agency by the investigator.
5. Action on the project may be initiated by the chief investigator in advance, if necessary, with the prior approval of the Vice-Chancellor soon after the receipt of sanction without waiting for the release of funds.
6. The funds received will be deposited in the 'Research Projects Fund' of the University and separate ledger maintained in the finance branch in respect of each project.
7. Requisition for the selection of the sanctioned staff/research scholar will be sent to the Registrar by the chief investigator with intimation to the Head of the Department. The sanctioned posts will be advertised by the Registrar within two weeks and the investigator-in-charge may send the advertisement to different academic institutions for favour of notifications.
8. The investigator-in-charge will constitute a selection committee comprising not less than three members, including the co-investigators, with the Chief-investigator as the chairman and at least one member from outside the Department. The selected staff in the project will be allowed all the usual facilities of the University.
9. All equipments/instruments purchased out of the project funds will become the property of the University, once the project is completed, unless a specific provision in this respect has been made by the funding agency.

REGULATIONS ON EXTERNAL RESEARCH PROJECTS

1. These regulations may be called Regulations on External Research Projects.
2. All research projects which may be funded by organisations other than the North Eastern Hill University shall be called " External Research Projects".
3. A teacher desirous of seeking financial support from an external organisation shall submit the project prepared in accordance with the requirements of the organisation concerned and indicating briefly in a separate memorandum the objectives of the project the way it is likely to support the general thrust of research in the University, through the Head of the Department to the School Board for its approval.
4. On the recommendations of the School Board, the Vice-Chancellor shall forward it with his own recommendations to the concerned funding organisation.
5. A copy of the memorandum of objectives and scope of the Project shall be placed before the Board of Post Graduate Studies and the Board of Research Studies for their information at their meetings held immediately after the Project has been recommended.
6. On receipt of information of the approval of the Project and sanction of funds by the funding organisation, the Chief Investigator may initiate work on the Project with the approval of the Vice-Chancellor.

The Vice-Chancellor may sanction an expenditure of a token amount for preliminary work on the Project if any. Appointments shall however be processed after the receipt of funds, copies of the sanction order will be maintained by the Registrar Finance Officer and the concerned Department.

7. The funds received will be deposited in the 'Research Projects Fund' of the University and a separate ledger maintained in the Finance Branch in respect of each Project .
8. Requisitions for selection of the sanctioned staff shall sent to the Registrar by the Chief Investigator through the Head of the Department. All requests received in every block of two months beginning with January shall be consolidated by the Registrar and sent for advertisement in the first week of the following month.
9. The Dean of the School will constitute a Selection Committee on the recommendations of the Chief Investigator comprising of not less than three members with the Chief Investigator as the Chairman and at least one member from outside the Department. In case of differences of opinion with regard to any matter connected with the procedure of selection the matter will be referred to the Dean of the School whose decision will be final. Provided that in case the consolidated emoluments in respect of a post exceeds Rs.1500/- per month the Selection Committee will be kept informed about the decisions by the Head of the Department. Research staff thus selected will be entitled, in addition to the salary in terms of the Project sanctioned, to the privileges of the University par with those enjoyed by the other research staff. Hostel accommodation may also be provided to them if available. Co-Investigators of the projects if any, will be incharge of the day to day work related to the project under the overall guidance of the Chief Investigator.
10. All equipment/instruments purchased out of the project funds will become the property of the University once the project is completed unless a specific provision in this respect has been made in the sanctioning letter.

Provided that the University pool the instruments even during the currency of the project for wider use in the Department/School if circumstances so warrant. The University may however decide the the instrument may continue to be under the administrative control of the Chief Investigator on behalf of the Deptt. In case the administration is taken over by the Deptt. the Chief Investigator will be given a priority in its use.

11. The Principal Investigator shall send a half yearly progress report on the research project to the Chairman of the concerned Board of Research Studies through the Head of the Department. The monthly fellowship bill of the research staff shall be forwarded by the Principal Investigator through the Head of the Department concerned to the Finance Officer for payment.
12. All administrative matters in relation to the project shall be within the purview of the University and governed by the provision of these regulations and of the Act the Statutes and Ordinances pertaining to such matters. In case of any differences of opinion on any matter not covered specifically by these regulations the matter may be decided by the Vice-Chancellor. No reference in regard to any administrative matter whatsoever shall be made by the Chief Investigator, Co-investigator, or any other staff connected with the project with the funding agency otherwise than with the approval of the Vice-Chancellor. In case there are any provision relating to administrative matters in the conditions of the grant by the funding agency not in consonance with the provision of these regulations the provisions of these regulations shall prevail provided that the Vice-Chancellor may agree to make an exception in a specific case before the project is sanctioned on a specific request by the funding agency, subject to ratification by the Board of the School/Academic Council.

In Honours Paper VIII Taittiriya Upanisad be replaced by Mandukya Upanisad.

Baruah was suffering from a head injury (Medical Certificates submitted to the University) and, therefore, apprehending poor result did not appear in one of the elective subjects, viz., Mathematics, but the candidate was declared passed in 3rd Division by transferring his marks in the addl. subject i.e. Biology to Mathematics as per Clause 15 of the Pre-University Regulation which says:

"If a candidate passes in English & MIL and fails to pass in only one elective subject under 2 (b) but passes in the additional subject, if any, the additional subject (other than additional Mathematics) shall automatically be interchanged with the elective subject in which he has failed, provided the candidate gets benefit of pass by such a change."

In view of the circumstances explained by the parent and the student in their petitions, subject to the Academic Council's approval, the Vice-Chancellor, NEHU was pleased to cancel the Examination of the above mentioned candidate & allowed him to appear as a fresh candidate at the ensuing Nov-Dec. '86 Examination.

The meeting decided to recommend to the Academic Council that it may consider the possibility of abolishing the Extra-Departmental Course as a compulsory course and instead to consider either of the following alternatives in its place :

(1) to offer a course of lecturer based upon the Extra-Departmental Course under the auspices of the Centre for Continuing Education which may be audited by all those who are interested in those courses both among the students and the teachers. The students may also be evaluated if they do desire and the certificate of proficiency may be awarded to them (2) Optional courses of an inter-departmental nature strictly within the School may be offered to the students.

The matter may be considered by Academic Council.

Extract of the Minutes of the Meeting of the Local Members of the Board of the School of Social Sciences held on 20th August, 1986.

The Dean read out the petition submitted by the students of the Department of Economics, requesting that instead of the Extra-Departmental Course, they may be allowed to offer one of the optional courses available in the Department of Economics. The Board discussed at length the desirability of continuing the Extra-Departmental Course in various Departments. The consensus emerging out of the discussion, was that the Extra-Departmental Course did not serve any useful academic purpose for the students and detracted from the benefit of specialisations available to them in their departments. It was decided to recommend to the Academic Council that it may consider the possibility of abolishing the Extra-Departmental Course as a compulsory course and instead to consider either of the following alternatives in its place : (1), to offer a course of lectures based upon the Extra-Departmental Course under the auspices of the Centre for Continuing Education which may be audited by all those who are interested in those courses both among the students and the teachers. The students may also be evaluated if they do desire and the certificate of proficiency may be awarded to them (2) Optional courses of an inter-departmental nature strictly within the School may be offered to the Students.

- (i) Report of the Committee appointed by the Academic Council to go into the question of establishing a Department of Christianity in the University -

The Academic Council in its 25th meeting held on the 17th/18th December, 1985 vide Resolution No.AC:25:85:05:6(i) considered the question of establishment of a Department of Christianity in the University and resolved to constitute a Committee to collect information on the structure, functions and programmes of the Department.

The Report of the Committee and the letter of the Expert Committee are placed at Annexures - A and B for consideration of the Academic Council.

Annexure- A

The Report of the Committee appointed by the Academic Council to go into the question of Establishing a Department of Christian Studies in the University.

A meeting of the Committee constituted by the Academic Council to go into the question of setting up a Department of Christianity in the University was held at 11:30 a.m. on the 7th June, 1986. The following were present :

1. Mr H.W.T. Syiem,
2. Prof. B. Pakem
3. Prof. M. Miri - Chairman

A report on the deliberations of the Committee follows:

(i) The Study of Religion has somehow been generally neglected by Indian Universities. Barring in a very few Universities there are no academic departments for religious studies as such, and this, in view of the extraordinary importance of religion in our individual, social, and political life, is, to say the least, rather surprising. This University is thus in a position to take a lead in this very important area. This can be done by establishing a School of Religious Studies as part of the School system of the University.

(ii) Action in this regard should, however, be taken cautiously and in several steps spanning over possibly two to three Five Year Plan periods.

(iii) To begin with, as part of the 7th Five Year Plan the University may think of establishing a Department of Christian Studies. The justification for this is as follows :

- (a) The vast majority of the people residing in the area under the jurisdiction of NEHU profess the Christian Religion. There is a great deal of enthusiasm among educated people of the area to learn more about their religion considering the great living tradition of continuous academic scholarship

extending over several centuries that has come into the understanding of Christianity.

- (b) There is only one University in the country (Mysore University) which has a full-fledged Department of Christian Studies.
 - (c) An objective, dispassionate study of the religion, such as only a University has the necessary framework to provide, is essential in view of our national goal of secularism.
- (iv) In the next phase of the development of the proposed School of Religious Studies the University may contemplate starting :
- (a) a Department of Buddhist Studies and
 - (b) a Department for the study of tribal religions.
- (a) A very important, though somewhat neglected section of the people of the north east are followers of both sects of the Buddhist religion, i.e., Mahayana and Hinayana. There is also, in our country, a general need for a more comprehensive understanding of Buddhism, a product of this country and its tradition, Here again the University can assume a leading role.
- (b) Although the religions of our tribes have been studied by Anthropologists, they have hardly been taken seriously as religions. i.e., as vehicles of moral and spiritual enlightenment. It is one of the prime responsibilities of NEHU, given its location and its constitutional objectives, to promote the study of tribal religions, qua religions and not merely as phenomena having merely social or psychological significance. A

Department for the study of tribal religions will, therefore, be most appropriate.

- (v) The School may eventually be completed by the establishment of a Department of Hinduism and a Department of Islamic Studies.

The Committee preferred the idea of a School of Religious Studies, to that of a single Department of Christianity or any other religion, primarily because the kind of interaction that is necessary and the academic attention that needs to be paid to the phenomenon of religion in our country will be best provided within a school system with full fledged Departments under it.

The Committee also recommends that a Committee of Experts may be set up by the University to make detailed suggestions aconcerning the proposal.

INTRODUCTION

The discussion for the possibility of establishing a Department of Christianity has been going on in the North East India Christian Council for the last six years (since 1979). The first formal contact was made with the Vice-Chancellor of NEHU on October 15, 1985 and a verbal proposal was presented to him by the Expert Committee appointed and authorised by the North East India Christian Council. The Vice-Chancellor accepted it with an open and enthusiastic gesture. He further suggested to the Committee to work out details of the Objectives so that he would take up this matter with the Academic Council of the University for necessary action. In pursuance of this, the Expert Committee submits this paper.

Indian Universities normally do not have departments of religion because India is a secular country. However, academic study of Hindu religion is being pursued in the Department of Philosophy in many universities in India. Studies of Hinduism, Sikhism and Islam are offered in some universities as in Banares Hindu University, Punjab University, Aligarh Muslim University and Osmania University.

Madurai Kamaraj University has recently instituted a Chair on Saiva Siddhanta (a Hindu religious system). No scope has so far been opened for an interdisciplinary academic study on Christianity or Christian Theology in any Indian University. The Senate of Serampore College which is recognised as a university status in granting degrees guaranteed by a Royal Charter (1827 and 1845, rev. 1951) and the Bengal Act No. IV of 1918, is the only institution where an academic study of Christianity and Christian Theology can be done on a professional and ministerial level.

The University of Mysore instituted a Department of Christianity from the academic year 1981-82. It is now possible to earn an officially recognised degree in Christianity at the University of Mysore. Tamilnadu Christian Council is now negotiating with the Madurai Kamaraj University to institute a Chair in Christianity. It is only right to say that the present negotiation of the North East India Christian Council with NEHU is a step-forward in the life of the Church in North East India.

INSTITUTION OF A DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIANITY AT NEHU

To initiate the programme, the appropriate University authorities be approached to institute a Department of Christianity and get the main objectives (will become as statutes eventually) approved for this purpose. The aim is to have a full-fledged Department in the University. Initially this may be established at the post-graduate level of degree courses leading to M.A., M.Phil., and Ph.D. The under-graduate B.A. degree course (both pass and honours) may also be introduced in some selected Colleges, for example, Union Christian College, Barapani, Patkai Christian College, Dimapur; Synod College, Shillong etc.

THE MAIN OBJECTIVES OF THE DEPARTMENT

1. To study Christianity with comparative study of other Indian religions. Extra-departmental courses on Christianity may be offered to students of other disciplines as well;
2. To promote academic study of Christianity in all its various branches, viz. the Bible (with relevant classical languages like Greek, Hebrew etc), Christian Theology, History of Christianity (with special reference to India and NorthEast India), practical theology and ministry including life experiences, religions and philosophy etc;
3. To study tribal cultures and religions of North East India in the context of Christian studies;
4. To conduct research in various branches of Christianity;
5. To hold seminars, symposia, etc. and to promote academic activities as contribution to deeper understanding of the different branches of Christianity;
6. To promote understanding and harmony between religious communities of our country;
7. To have meaningful and understanding dialogue with other branches of studies at the University;
8. To provide facilities for academic research in Christian studies with a view to achieving sound academic excellence;
9. To develop a departmental library which is equipped with upto-date Christian publications as well as photostat copies, films, etc. of important manuscripts, documents and rare materials.
10. To collect historical and literary source materials and up-to-date references for conducting research work as in different aspects of Christianity.
11. To arrange for a suitable number of scholarships for students in this Department; and
12. Professional training in Christian Ministry in the Churches will be the concern of the Theological College or Seminary unless it is otherwise decided by mutual consent of the churches concerned, but this does not mean that ordinand students are barred from admission will depend on the choice of the sending Churches; and as such academic

The Inspection Committee visited Sohra College, Cherrapunji on May 20, 1986. The Committee consisted of the following members:

The Committee met in the Office Chamber of the Principal, Sohra College. Members of the teaching staff of the College were also present. The College was established in July, 1982. First batch of student emerged in 1984 (February examination) appeared as private candidates from Shillong Centre. If granted provisional affiliation it will be the first College at P.U. level at Cherrapunji at a distance of 53 Km from Shillong. We were informed that Cherrapunji is the birth place of Khasi Education and Literature.

Legal Status :

The College is registered under the Indian Societies Registration Act XXI of 1868 No. SR/Sc-54/86 of 1986 dated February 18, 1986.

Governing Body :

The College has a Governing Body and Sponsoring Body. The Governing Body has been constituted as per University Ordinances. The College has also framed rules and regulations of the Governing Body.

Physical facilities :

The College is an evening College. The classes are held in the Cherra Presbyterian High School, Cherrapunji. Permission for holding the Classes in the School have sought by the School Principal. The College has acquired 9445.12 Sq.m of land and is likely to construct School Building and shift to its permanent site within a period of 3 years.

Financial Position :

The College has deposited Rs.1 lakh in MCAB and UCB Banks in Cherrapunji as fixed deposit. The current balance available to the College as saving account is Rs.12,461.03. INSPECTION REPORT OF THE RI BHOI COLLEGE : NONGPOH
FOR PROVISIONAL AFFILIATION

A Committee consisting of the following visited the Ri-Bhoi College on the 30th May, 1986.

Brief introduction

The College came into existence on the 1st March, 1984 with the initiative of the local people with the introduction of the 1st Year class of +2 course in Arts. The College imparts instructions in History, Economics, Pol. Science, Education, English and Khasi literature at the +2 level.

At present, there are nine teachers including the Principal.

The subject-wise break-up of teachers is as follows:

History - 2, Economics - 1, Pol. Science - 2, Education - 1, English-1,
Khasi - 2. TOTAL - 9

Result

The first batch of 14 students appeared in the University examination in 1985 and eight of them came out successful. The result is quite satisfactory on the part of a newly established college.

Accommodation.

At present, the college is being housed in the local High School building with sufficient rooms and etc. However, the management have already acquired land to construct their own building. We have assured that the college building along with the hostel will come up in a year or two.

Student Strength

30 students have been enrolled for the 1st year and 28 students for the 2nd year at the +2 stage level. Taking into account relatively a large number of feeding High School are hope that enrolment will go on increasing year by Year.

Library facilities

There are 1400 nos. of text books on different subjects and 200 nos. reference books in the library. A reading room is also attached to it for use by the students and teachers. Though no limit can be put on the number of books in the library of an educational institution. Yet 1000 titles are quite a satisfactory number for a +2 college.

Financial Position

The management have deposited Rupees One lakh (document attached) with the Meghalaya Co-operative Apex Bank, Nongpoh with affiliation being granted. They are expected to get regular financial grant from the Govt. of Meghalaya.

Recommendations

Nongpoh is the Headquarters of the Ri-Bhoi Civil Sub-Division at present. There is every hope that it may turn into a district Headquarter in near future. Taking into account (i) the numbers of feeding High Schools (14 Nos) in the area (ii) the nearest college (U.C.C.) being located in a distance of about 30 kilometres (iii) the educational backwardness of Meghalaya in general and Nongpoh in particular, the Committee unanimously recommends provisional affiliation at the +2 level.

(iii) Grant of Permanent Affiliation

The question of Permanent Affiliation of the colleges which are in existence for more than 10 years has been examined and the following notes are submitted for consideration of the Academic Council.

1. Excluding the Law colleges, there are 20 colleges which are due for Permanent Affiliation. The case of the latter group may be taken up after the receipt of some information from the Bar Council of India.

2. Of the 20 colleges due for Permanent Affiliation, CDC has received 10 applications (as per list A). The information with regard to these colleges has been found satisfactory in as much as they satisfy the necessary requirement for Permanent Affiliation. In terms of EC Resolution No. EC:45:85:02(iv) read with AC Resolution No. AC:23:85:5(viii) the cases of these colleges numbering 10 as per List A below may be forwarded to the Affiliation Committee for according Permanent Affiliation in terms of ^{the} EC Resolution quoted above.

3. The remaining 10 colleges as per list B below have not submitted full information. Some of them have not even applied for Permanent Affiliation as a result of which the University is not in a position to get the required information particularly with regard to the legal Status of the college, physical, financial and academic facilities, etc. However the CDC is in touch with these colleges for getting the necessary information. Their cases will be put up when complete information is available.

Extract of A. C. Resolution from its 23rd meeting re: Permanent Affiliation.

AC:23:85:05(viii):- The Chairman invited the attention of the Council to the fact that according to the provision of the University Ordinances, colleges which have enjoyed privileges under NEHU for ten years or more can be granted permanent affiliation. Unfortunately, this question has got mixed up and a clear policy had not been followed. It is also to be noted that permanent affiliation of a college is absolute and is not related to any scale or a set of courses for which the concerned colleges has to seek permission of the University. It was, therefore, suggested that all those colleges which have been affiliated for ten years or more may be granted permanent affiliation automatically, unless there is something adverse against them. The council resolved that all colleges which have been affiliated to the University for ten years or more and whose performances has been satisfactory may be granted affiliation forthwith. The Council authorised the V. C. to take action in this regard for the existing colleges. A suitable procedure may be evolved for granting Permanent Affiliation in future.

Meeting of the Executive Council.

(iv) Permanent affiliation of colleges :

EC:45:85:02 (iv): The Executive Council RESOLVED that the Affiliation Committee, which has been constituted to look into such matters may examine and make recommendations for all colleges which have been in existence for ten years or more on 1st January, 1985. In their case, it is not necessary that an Inspection Committee may be constituted. The Executive Council will consider formally according permanent affiliation on the basis of their recommendation. For other colleges, which may become due for permanent affiliation the Affiliation Committee may work out suitable criteria as per provisions in the Ordinances.

It was noted at this stage that affiliation to various colleges is being granted at two stages, viz., P.U. and Degree. A question was raised whether a college which began as a P.U. college and which has been given permission to start degree courses will have to wait for ten years before grant of permanent affiliation as a degree college.

The Executive Council RESOLVED that a Degree college may become eligible for permanent affiliation after ten years of its inception and affiliation as a college or after five years of temporary affiliation as a degree college, whichever is later. Suitable amendments in the Ordinance may be made accordingly.

Six students in the College of Agriculture, who were deputed by the Department of Agriculture, Government of Nagaland, prayed vide their petition at Annexure - II for exemption from undertaking P.U.(Agri) Course of study as they had already undergone VLW training course for two years and to allow them to join first year B.Sc. course in the College. They stated in their petition that some Agricultural Universities like P.A.U., Ludhiana and Agricultural College of Hissar, Haryana recognised the two year VLW in-service training and allowed to join the degree course or to undergo condensed course.

The matter is placed before the Academic Council for favour of consideration.

Sir,

We, the following undersigned VLW's in-service students studying in the PU, NEHU SASRD Medziphema, have the honour to submit this petition to you for favour of information, consideration and necessary action.

That Sir, at present there are six VLW'S in-service students deputed from Department of Agriculture, Govt of Nagaland who are studying in the said School. During the last recent years after passing matriculation examination; we have undergone VLW training for two years course which is considered as equivalent to 10+2 system of Examination. During those years, we have already completed the following major subjects like (1) Agronomy (2) Agri. Engineering (3) Horticulture and (4) Animal Husbandry etc., and even after the completion of this course we have to sit again in P.U.(Ag) for another two years which is just a repetition of the same course unnecessarily. We as a Govt. servant also do not like to spend too many years (2*4) in educational Institution while we are in service in the interest of the public service. It would benefit both the individual and department concerned if your kind authority accept this idea and do some positive steps on this issue.

As a matter of fact, some Agril Universities like P.A.U. Ludhiana, Agril, College of Hissar, Haryana do exempt the VLW in-service candidates from taking P.U.(Ag) course and they are allowed to sit in degree level or offer condensed course. In this way, many of our friends (and some have already finished) are studying degree course only without studying in P.U.(Ag).

We therefore, request your kind authority to look into this matter and allow us to sit in 1st year B.Sc. or to have special condensed course by cutting 2 years which we have already covered.

The two Deans of Schools of Physical Sciences
and Life Sciences have furnished their comments on the
evaluation of annual academic production of faculty members.
The comments are placed at Annexures- V and VI respectively
for consideration of the Academic Council.

PHYSICAL SCIENCE

A note on evaluation of annual academic achievements submitted by the Dean, School of Physical Sciences, NEHU.

1. A self-assessment of each faculty members made on the basis of a questionnaire containing three principle aspects, namely, teaching, research and administrative work is to be obtained before the closure of winter semester, by about December 15, of each year.
2. The questionnaire should have a provision to get a brief write-up from each faculty member on the proposed programme chalked out by him/her for the subsequent academic year in the context of teaching, research and administrative work. This write-up is intended to get information, in addition to the research programme, on new courses in frontier areas with course structure and bibliography suggested by the faculty member. It should also contain suggestions in simplifying the academic and administrative procedures to facilitate improvement in the direction of attaining academic excellence by the University.
3. This information is to be sent by the University to an external expert in the branch of specialisation of the faculty member concerned for an assessment.
4. The assessment is to be kept strictly confidential to be used only when desired in the context of promotion or extension of services of the faculty member concerned.
5. However, one year for such an assessment is considered to be too short to provide a correct evaluation. A minimum duration of three years may be considered.

Annexure - VI

LIFE SCIENCES

The procedures for the evaluation of faculty in the School of Life Sciences should be based on the teaching responsibilities as assigned from time to time by the performance of the students in a particular department in a given course conducted by a teacher can also be taken into account.

In the same way, the research contribution of a faculty can be evaluated in terms of the publications in standard journals, operation of research schemes and the quality of research out put.

While evaluating the teaching and research output the constraints under which the individual member is operating should be taken into account.
