The Centre for Adult and Continuing Education of the North-Eastern Hill University committed itself to programmes which are ambitious and wide-ranging, including formal as well as non-formal courses.

The main thrust of the Center's programmes is to extend and up-dating the skills of individuals and organisations in every part of various communities through community oriented courses, conferences, seminars and workshops. The basic formulation of all the activities of the Centre is to develop links between education, work and productivity, development for local and national needs and aspirations.

The Centre has also been collaborating with other agencies and organisations at State and National levels in organising such programmes.

Centre for Creative Arts.

The Centre for Creative Arts was started in 1977, by the University with a view to providing incentives in Art appreciation and education especially in this region. This was felt essential because only a few Universities in the country have so far introduced Art Education in the Post-Graduate level. The Centre has been striving to specify the important areas of research based upon the concept of the role of Creative Arts.

An important step in this regard is the publication of "Ka Jingpynroi bad Jingpynriewspah ia ka Jinghikai ia ka Khasi ha ha ki Skul, College bad University" by the Centre, devised to provide an appropriate Text-Book for Post-Graduate level and B. Ed. students. This was done for the improvement of standard of teaching Khasi. Infact, it is hoped that this publication would help the University in its plan to start M.A. Course in Khasi. The publication of this book is positive step towards meeting the inadequacy in text book materials that the Khasi language has been facing through the decades gone by.

The Centre has been making efforts to specify the areas of studies in Symbolic and Performing Art Designing and Applied Art, Folk Art and Cultural Heritage, Decorative Art and Craft and other patterns such as Fine Arts, Commercial Arts and Generalistic. These efforts are in pursuance of the need to organise courses and programmes in conformity with the Proceedings of Workshop on Art sponsored by the UGC in 1977. This would be helpful to introduce M.A. (Creative Art) programme in the University.

High lights of the activities of the Centre

Course on elementary music : During the year under review the Centre conducted a three months course in elementary music to teach lessons on Tonic Solfa and Staff Notation. This was done with the intention to channelise talents in vocal music in keeping with the traditional norms in harmonisation. Voice

testing also constituted a part of the course. This helps to gain basic knowledge of the above mentioned aspects and of other musical forms. The course aims at creating an awareness of the value of the indigenous form of music and doing away with cheap and imitative forms. The Centre admitted 116 trainees to the course. The Theoretical and Practical examination will be conducted soon.

Collaboration in Film making

The Centre collaborated with the Khasi Cultural Society in making the film "Ka Synjuk Ri ki Laiphew Syiem". Nearly 250 actors and actresses participated in different roles.

The movie was based on the local history of the period 1780 to 1810 A.D. The film displays cultural, socio-economic and political scenes and provides other glimpses of the past. The Centre in collaboration with the Khasi Cultural Society helped by more than 35 composers, artists and musicians in dubbing the film. The Reader-in-Charge of the Centre made the screen play.

The first screening of the film was conducted on September 9, 1980 in the Auditorium of the State Central Library, Shillong, under the sponsorship of the University.

Analysis of tribal teachers/students and institutions

In the Seminar on Art, 8 University and College Teachers, 30 High School Teachers, 30 College Students and 20 other participants have benefited from the *Seminar* and about 40 artists participated at its valedictory function.

The Reader-in-Charge attended a Seminar on Status of Tribal Literature held in March 1981 sponsored by the Department of Sociology and Naga Scholars' Society at Mokokchung and delivered a Paper entitled *Naga Literature in Retrospect*.

He also participated at the Seminar on Indigenous Institutions of the Garos, the Khasis and the Jaintias held in December 1980 sponsored by the Deptt. of Education, Government of Meghalaya and presented a paper entitled *Arts and Crafts of the Khasi People*.

Research

The Reader-in-Charge has worked on the second revised and enlarged edition of the *History and Culture of the Khasi People* published by the United Publishers, Gauhati for the benefit of Post-Graduate students.

The Centre is making efforts to corroborate new findings on Chinese sculpture and is planning to publish a separate report.

- (A) *Sources of modern Assam history* published in the book entitled *Source of the History of India Vol. III* pp, 166-177 of the *Indian Historical Studies*, Calcutta, 1980. This was the outcome of the proceedings drawn by the 16th Annual Historical Conference held at Dibrugarh in 1978.
- (B) *Sources of the History of the Khasi-Jaintia* appeared in the *Sources of History Volume II* 1979 pp. 194-205 of the *Indian Historical Studies*, Calcutta.
- (C) *Social and Religious Reform Movements in the 19th and 20th centuries in Nagaland*, published in the *Social and Religious Reform Movements* of the Institute of Historical Studies Calcutta, pp. 425-438.

The Paper B and Paper C were the outcome of the 12th Annual Historical Conference held at NEHU, Shillong in October 1974 in which the writer himself was its local Secretary and the two papers were presented in that Conference.

Another work entitled *Biography of U Tirot Sing* has been approved by the Publications Division, Ministry of Information and Broadcasting for its publication. The work will be published soon.

Seminar on Art

The most important Seminar organised by the Centre was on *Art* held on March 18-20. The Seminar, the first of its kind, was intended to draw resource persons and experts who could formulate realistic views on Art, its conception and role in educational orientation, forms and contents, Symbolic and Performing Art, Applied and Practical Art, Folk Art and Folklore, Commercial Arts and its potentialities, Decorative Art and Handicraft, Art education and other themes. The Seminar was a success, several experts having participated and presented papers on different topics such as Art education and Role of Art in educational reconstruction, Music and Dance, Art of writing, Art of public speaking, Forms of Tribal Art, Sericulture-Weaving, Handicraft, Dress and Ornament, Folk Art and Festivals, Art History and techniques of production. The experts represented different Universities and Institutions. About 22 papers were read. The Seminar made some important recommendations. Mr. E. W. Davies Jyrwa, Station Director of AIR inaugurated the Seminar and the valedictory address was delivered by Mrs. M. R. Mawlong, Registrar, NEHU. The closing ceremony of the Seminar was concluded with an entertainment programme and a film show on Khasi History.

Achievements of the Seminars

The Seminar was held in pursuance to the previous courses, demonstrations, workshops and other extension programmes for identifying different areas with a view to evolve P. G. syllabus on Regional Art. An Editorial Body was constituted to bring out a publication of the proceedings of the Seminar and to examine its recommendations for follow-up action for the benefit of educational institutions. It was proposed that more Art programmes should be sponsored which have relevance on these issues.

Collaboration with other Agencies

The Centre has received collaboration from the Khasi Cultural Society in exploring and utilising tunes, songs and lyrics both indigenous and modern. The collaboration with the Department of Education and State Council of Educational Research and Training has been very valuable. The Government of Meghalaya, from time to time, deputed school teachers to the Seminars and Workshops on Creative Art and Training.

The Reader-in-Charge has served for two terms in the Planning and Advisory Committee, State Council of Educational Research and Training as a special representative of NEHU.

Library System

The library system of the North-Eastern Hill University consists of the Main Central Library, School libraries, Departmental libraries, Campus libraries and College libraries. In the year review some important changes were made.

The Library has introduced uniform system of issuing Books in the Campus, College and Departmental libraries. The procedure of issuing tickets to readers and students, and pass books for teachers as started at the Central Library was also introduced in the departmental libraries., campus libraries and college libraries.

With the exception of Mizoram, all departmental libraries at Bijni, Campus libraries of Nagaland and the library of the college of Agriculture, Medziphema have started cataloguing system for quick information and service.

Acquisition Section

The acquisition section procures books for the entire library system of the University with an exception to the Agricultural College. Keeping in view of the increase of the number of students and research scholars during the year the section gave top priority to the procurement of sufficient number of copies of prescribed text books. Orders were also placed for the lists of urgent books from the campus and college libraries. This practice has started since 1978. This year about 42 books were received under this arrangement. The section takes notice that important books are added to the library.

Processing Section

About 15,000 titles were processed and released during the year for the use of the readers. A list of new additions were arranged according to subjects for the convenience of the readers. The library has processed and released about 3500 Volumes of important collections in the year.

Circulation Section :

In addition to the day-to-day services ; the following programmes were started during the year. The library has started initiation programme for the freshers and providing guidance to the new students. To cater to the need of the campus and college libraries the Central Library has circulated important books on an exchange basis.

During the year an increased interest was noticed from both students and research scholars in using the library reference section. On the whole a 30% increase in the use of this section was noted. The Library also provided data bank for the benefit of the research scholars.

Documentation Section

In the year 1980-81 the documentation section brought out the following publications as a part of the information service :

- (a) Four Issues of the Latest Article Bulletin of 966 entries in all.
- (b) A Bibliography on Nagaland, Arunachal Pradesh and Mizoram of 1956 entries in collaboration with NERC/ICSSR. The same was circulated among the research scholars and institutions in this Region and outside.
- (c) A Bibliography of 206 bibliographies available in the University Library. which has been made available for research purpose.
- (d) A complete documentation of Executive Council resolutions from the First to the Twenty-second Meeting was completed.
- (e) Reprographic Services : Xeroxing facility provided by the section has been of immense help to the readers.

Bindery

With the availability of binding materials, the section has started binding and repairing books and journals. During the year 150 books were rebound and 50 books were repaired.

Seminars

Mr. J. C. Binwal, Librarian attended an All India Seminar on "Relevance of Library and information science education to the changing needs of the Country" at Banaras Hindu University from March 13 to 18, 1981.

Mr. J. C. Binwal, Miss I. Majaw, Mrs R. Mishra, Mr. L.P. Pathak and Mr. J. Majumdar attended a two-day seminar on "Library system, data collection and dissemination of information for North-Eastern Region" at Gauhati in March, 1981.

Campus Development : Engineering Cell

The North-Eastern Hill University was established in the year 1973 by an Act of Parliament, to serve the needs of the entire hill areas of the North East comprising of the two state of Meghalaya and Nagaland and the Union Territories of Mizoram and Arunachal Pradesh. Since Shillong is the most developed town and a strong educational centre in the North-East, it was therefore chosen as the Headquarter of the University.

As a first step of the improvement and development of the proposed site for the permanent University Campus at Mawkyroh-Umshing, Shillong, the University had taken up the construction of 2.20 k.m. access road at an estimated cost of Rs. 6,62,680/-. The estimate and plan for provision of water supply to the permanent Campus of the North-Eastern Hill University at Mawkyroh-Umshing amounting to Rs. 19,79,500/- had been submitted to the University Grants Commission.

For providing and construction of electricity to the North-Eastern Hill University Campus at Mawkyroh-Umshing it is proposed to tap the power requirement from the existing 11-KV line of the Meghalaya State Electricity Board which is situated at the outskirts of the University Campus. In this connection, an estimate amounting to Rs. 1,74,400/- has been approved by the University Grants Commission.

The Master Plan of the permanent University Campus at Shillong includes the Academic Complex, Housing Complex, Sports Complex and Recreation Centre for the students. The building programme is proposed to be carried out in three phases. The first phase is envisaged for a student population of 2,000, the second phase for another 1,000 and the ultimate strength of 4,000 is expected in future.

Finance And Accounts Department

Against the total provision of Rs. 2,16,000.00 under Revenue (Rs. 1,26,45,000.00) and Capital (Rs. 89,55,000.00) an expenditure of Rs. 1,57,58,055.00 was incurred during the year, 1980-81 under the following 2 broad heads :

The figures of expenditure are provisional as the annual accounts prepared for the year are yet to be audited by the Accountant General Office.

The post of Finance Officer has only been filled up with effect from 12.12.80 prior to which the Department had to be managed by one Assistant Finance Officer.

No Internal Audit Section could be set up as yet, nor the Students Accounts could be separated from the Cash Section which are now managed by a Sr. Asstt. (Cash). Besides, no arrangements could be made to decentralise the financial activities relating to the outlying campuses and colleges which are still being managed from the Head-quarters. For the overall improvement it is, considered necessary that the Finance and Accounts Department be strengthened by the addition of 1 Dy. Finance Officer, 2 Asstt Finance Officers and 2 Superintendents.

Finance Department is very much handicapped due to non-release of grants according to the approved budget estimates. During the year under review only a sum of Rs. 2.00 lakhs was released as basic grant for 'Books and Journals' against the provision of Rs. 8.00 lakhs under Capital. No fund under Administrative machinery (Furniture and Equipment and 'Laboratory Equipment was released during the year. Besides, the fund available for running the Science Departments was found to be quite inadequate to meet their requirements.

Department of Physical Training, Sports and Games.

During the year under review the Department organised the 8th Inter-Collegiate Sports Meet at Chumukedima, Dimapur in the State of Nagaland from December 16 to 18, 1980 in the beautiful Sports Complex of the Nagaland Police Training Centre which was made available by the Govt. of Nagaland for this purpose. The entire meet was conducted smoothly and successfully due to the full co-operation and assistance of the Govt. of Nagaland as well as the Commandant and officers of the Police Training Centre and the Jawans. Contingents from various colleges numbering nearly 800 boys and girls were accommodated in the Patkai Christian College and our thanks are due to the Acting Principal of the college for all his co-operation and assistance.

Prior to this tournament the Zonal tournament were conducted at Dimapur for the Nagaland colleges at Aizawl for the Mizoram Colleges and in Shillong for the Meghalaya Colleges. Most of the colleges affiliated to this University participated in this tournament, The winners and runners as the case may be from this Zonal tournament participated in the Inter-Zonal tournament held at Dimapur. Due to the disturbed condition in Assam making travelling plans difficult, no team could be sent to participate in the Inter-University tournaments. No proper training or adequate training programmes could be drawn up due to lack of sports facilities such as play grounds, hostel accommodation etc. and until and unless the campus is ready we would still be handicapped in this sphere. NEHU is grateful to all the colleges for their co-operation.

National Service Scheme (NSS)

The Aim of the NSS is "to promote national consciousness and a sense of social responsibility inculcation of discipline and dignity of labour and help students to develop total personality".

The activities under this scheme are broadly divided into two categories viz, Regular Activities and Special Camping Activities.

The Ministry of Education and Culture, Department of Education, Govt. of India in consultation with the State Govts. concerned allocated strength of NSS for the year under report. Regular Activities : Each NSS Unit of the colleges adopt a village/institution and each NSS volunteer is to spend 120 hours a year in improvement and development works for the adopted village/institution. During the year under report, 24 colleges under NEHU participated in the NSS, and Regular Activities have been carried on under the supervision of the NSS Programme Officers of the colleges. The projects taken up were as follows :

- 1) Organising First-Aid Training Courses for the NSS Volunteers,
- 2) Organising free medical check-ups and medical aids and free distribution of medicines,
- 3) Visits to hospitals,
- 4) Cleaning and improving areas surrounding colleges.
- 5) Propagation of family planning,
- 6) Tree plantation,
- 7) Organising Adult Education Centre,
- 8) Construction of public urinal/latrines.

In pursuance to the Appeal of the Prime Minister, the NSS Deptt. of the University organised a Special Tree Plantation Campaign by the NSS volunteers of the Shillong Colleges. Seven colleges viz. the Shillong College ; Sankardev College ; St. Mary's College ; Lady Keane Girls' College ; Synod College ; St. Edmund's College and St. Anthony's College with 100 boys and 100 girls participated in the campaign which was held from the July 14 to 16, 1980 along the Shillong-Gauhati Road covering a distance of about 30 Kms., from the 9th Km. point to the 30th Km. point, and also on the area of the North-Eastern Police Training Centre and around the Barapani Lake. Over 12,000 seedlings were planted on the average of 22 seedlings per student per day.

The seedlings and technical help were provided by the Forest Department, East Khasi Hills District. The seedlings consisted of six varieties : (1) Lega Stroemia Indica (2) Bougane villae (3) Jakranda species ; (4) Cherry Blossom ; (5) Acacia Auticuliflowers (6) Sali species or Weeping willow. The after care of the planted seedlings will be provided by the Forest Department, Govt. of Meghalaya.

Every morning the students left Shillong at 7 a.m. and started planting at 9 a.m. Break-fast, lunch and tea were provided in the sites. They worked till 3.30 p.m. and returned home.

On the last day the closing ceremony was held at the Lake View Cottage, Barapani, in which the Meghalaya Health Minister, Mr. D. D. Lapang was the Chief Guest. The function was presided over by Dr. S. C. Banwar, Pro Vice-Chancellor, NEHU.

On the whole, the campaign was very successful. The students showed great enthusiasm and worked inspite of the scorching sun and heavy rain. The Divisional Forest Officer and his staff worked hand in hand with the students for all the three days.

Commerce Department

The course in the Master Degree of Commerce was started in the Nagaland Campus of the University in March 1981, The Department is the first of its kind in the North-Eastern Hill University.

The number of candidates who appeared at each of the Examinations and their results are furnished in the Statistics. All Examinations were held according to the Schedule notified by the University. There was no delay in the publication of the results in the Under-Graduate and Post-Graduate levels.

In spite of the abnormal situation in Assam, the University was able to provide Examination Centres in different places of Nagaland and Mizoram. Such a success speaks of the co-operation and support received from the State Governments of the three political units.

The enrolment of students at different levels during the year under review is furnished in the Statistics and the enrolment in the College of Agriculture Medziphema, Nagaland, are also included in the Statistics. The Semester Examinations of the College of Agriculture were conducted during the year.

The Randomisation of Roll Numbers in the Under-Graduate levels which was first adopted in 1976 for P. U. (Arts) only had been extended for the second time in P.U. (Science) and Degree Arts in 1981.

All Semester Examinations in the Post-Graduate Departments of Shillong/Kohima/Aizawl were also conducted.

The Third Convocation of the University was held on May, 26, 1981 and Degrees were awarded to the eligible candidate both for Graduates and Post-Graduates for the year 1979 and 1980. The University conferred 315 degrees in person and 97 in absentia. For the first time in the history of this University M. Phil. and Ph. D. Degrees were conferred to 7 (seven) and 11 (eleven) candidates respectively. The details of the statistics are given in the Appendix.

College Development Council

The Sub-Committee of College Development Council appointed during 1979-80, completed its survey of the affiliated colleges in August, 1981.

The survey report was considered by the College Development Council and action was initiated for the introduction of Refresher Course, Question Banks, Faculty exchange programmes and the restructuring of courses.

Short Reports of the affiliate Colleges

Research in progress

The College has recently acquired 10 acres of land which is being developed as an agricultural farm for teaching and research. The research programme initiated by various disciplines during the session is as follows :

Deptt. of Agril. Botany

Around 200 germplasm lines of paddy were collected from N.E. region and other universities in India. The lines have been shown in replicated trial to assess various economic traits and the trial is continuing.

Deptt. of Agril. Zoology and Entomology

Role of the local earth worms and the soil arthropods in the fertility and aeration in the seed nature is being investigated.

Pesticide trials are being conducted at the experimental farm of the college for evaluation of different in-secticides against the major insect pest of rice and maize.

Deptt. of Agril. Chemistry and Soil Science

A field experiment at the college research farm was laid out to evaluate the pattern of major nutrient utilisation by paddy at various growth stages under Nagaland Agroclimatic conditions. Plant samples of various stages are being collected and will be used to establish various aspects of nutrients utilization with respect to growth stage.

College Library

The fund allocation of the library increased from Rs. 50,000/- to Rs. 1,00,000/- for books. During 1980-81 one hundred fifteen reference books and 922 general books were procured. In the last academic session the library has subscribed 88 journals, out of which 47 are foreign journals.
