





**ON THE ADMISSION OF STUDENTS TO THE UNIVERSITY
INCLUDING ITS AFFILIATED COLLEGES**

(Under Section 26(1) (a) of the NEHU Act, 1973)

1. Without prejudice to the provisions of the Act and Statutes, and other rules of the University, a student shall be eligible for admission to any Under-Graduate or Post-Graduate Course of study, M.Phil and Ph.D. degree under the University if she/he has passed the examination or examinations prescribed by the University for admission to the concerned course or course(s).
2. The candidates seeking admission to a course of study in the University including the affiliated colleges, must satisfy the rules and conditions made in this behalf.

Foreign students may be admitted to various programmes of study under the following categories.

- A) Cultural Exchange-Fellowship Programme of Govt. of India.
 - B) Self-financing students
 - C) Short-term programmes (not leading to award of any degree/diploma/ certificate).
3. The reservation policy as adopted by the University from time to time in conformity with the policy of the Government of India shall be applicable for admission of students.

ON NOTIFICATION OF VACANCIES AND PRELIMINARY SELECTIONS
(Under Section 26(1) (q) of the NEHU Act, 1973)

Mode of

Advertisement 2.

- (1) All vacancies in academic cadres of the University shall be advertised in atleast four Indian papers, one each from the eastern, northern, western and southern region and at least on regional paper each of the constituent units of the University. Provided that if there are some academic positions for which the candidates are likely to be exclusively available in a particular region or regions, advertisement may be limited to the papers in that region or regions, only after recording the reasons for doing so in writing and with prior approval of the Vice-Chancellor.
- (2) The reservation policy of Government of India as adopted by the University from time to time shall be applicable to teaching positions at the University which shall be clearly indicated in the advertisement.
- (3) The conditions, if any, under which the essential qualifications are relaxable shall be clearly stated in the advertisement.
- (4) The closing date for receipt of applications shall be atleast five weeks from the date of appearance of the advertisement in the papers.
Provided that in emergent circumstances the notice could be reduced to three weeks for reasons to be recorded in writing.
- (5) No application received after the closing date for the receipt of application will be entertained unless the delay is accounted for by dislocation in the postal system or in its being forwarded by the appropriate authorities or such other valid reasons as may be accepted by the Vice-Chancellor.

ON THE BOARD OF POST-GRADUATE STUDIES IN MEDICAL SCIENCES

Under Section 26(1) (k) of the Nehu Act ,1973 read with clause (2) of Statute 18

1. Constitution : The Board of Post-graduate Studies in Medical Sciences shall comprise of:
 - (i) The Chairman (to be nominated by the Vice-Chancellor from among the Academic Council members)
 - (ii) All Heads and Professors of the Departments offering post-graduate courses in Medical Sciences.
 - (iii) One Associate Professor and one Assistant Professor of each department offering post-graduate course in Medical Sciences, by rotation, in order of seniority.
 - (iv) One external member not below the rank of Associate Professor in each of the subjects in which post-graduate course in Medical Sciences are offered.

2. Term of office: The term of office of the members other than ex-officio members shall be three years.

3. Function : The functions of the Board shall be
 - (i) To recommend to the Academic Council courses of studies for the programme in Medical Sciences.
 - (ii) To recommend to the Academic Council appointment of examiners for the post-graduate courses in Medical Sciences other than for research degree in accordance with the provision of the regulation about the examination of the University.
 - (iii) To recommend to the Board of Research Studies subjects for research for various degrees.
 - (iv) To recommend to the Academic Council measures for improvement of the post-graduate teaching and research in Medical Sciences.
 - (v) To perform such other functions as may be assigned to it by the Academic Council and the Vice-Chancellor.

4. Meeting : The meetings of the Board shall be convened by the chairperson of the Board. Notice of the meetings shall be issued atleast 14 (fourteen) days before the date fixed for the meeting. The Board shall meet atleast once in a year.

5. Quorum : The quorum for the meeting shall be one-third of the total membership of the Board.

6. Rules of business : The rules of conduct of the meeting shall be as prescribed by regulation.

ON POST-GRADUATE STUDIES IN MEDICAL SCIENCES

A. ELIGIBILITY FOR ADMISSION

1. A candidate must possess MBBS degree from a University recognized by the Medical Council of India and must have completed the required period of internship on or before 30th April of the year of appearing for the entrance examination.
2. The candidates who have obtained their MBBS degree from a foreign country will have to produce the proof of their having passed the qualifying examination held by the Medical College of India and also of their registration with the Medical Council of India.
3. The candidates who have already done / are pursuing M.D. / M.S. in any subject at the time of counseling shall not be considered for admission to M.D./ M.S. courses. If it is found at a later stage that the candidate has given false undertaking at the time of counselling, his / her candidature / registration will be cancelled.

B. PERIOD OF TRAINING

The period of training for the award of various post-graduate degrees, diplomas or certificate courses shall be as follows:

(1) Doctor of Medicine (M.D.) / Master of Surgery (M.S.)

The period of training for obtaining these degrees shall be three completed years including the period of examination.

Provided that in the case of students having a recognised two year Post-graduate diploma course in the same subject, the period of training, including the period of examination, shall be two years, provided the candidate applies for such relaxation.

(2) Doctor of Medicine (D.M.) / Master Chirurgiae (M.Ch.)

The period of training for obtaining these degrees shall be three completed year (including the examination period) after obtaining M.D./M.S. degrees, or equivalent recognised qualification in the required subject.

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(3) Diplomas

The period of training for obtaining a post-graduate Diploma shall be two completed years including the examination period.

(4) Post-graduate Certificate [called as Post-Doctoral Certificate Course (PDCC)]:
The period of training for obtaining the Post-graduate Certificate shall be 1 or 2 completed years including the examination period depending on the speciality.

C. TRAINING PROGRAMME

- a. All candidates joining the Post-graduate programme shall work as full time residents during the period of teaching and training, attending not less than 80% (eighty percent) of the teaching and training during each calendar year, and given full time responsibility, assignments and participation in all facets of the educational process in addition to his / her regular clinical duties.
- b. Post-graduate students shall maintain a record (log) book of the work carried out by them and the training programme undergone during the period of training.
- c. During the training for Degree / Diploma / Certificates to be awarded in clinical disciplines, there shall be proper training in basic medical sciences related to the disciplines concerned as per Medical Council of India norms.
- d. The Post-graduate students shall be required to participate in the teaching and training programme of undergraduate students and interns.

D. EXAMINATIONS

i. GENERAL:

- a. Examinations shall be held separately for M.D. / M. S / Diploma / Certificate courses
- b. Theory will consist of 4 (four) papers for M.D. / M.S., D.M. / M.Ch, 3 (three) for Diplomas and 2 (two) for P.D.C.C.

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c. The objective of practical examinations will be to test the knowledge and competence of the student for undertaking independent work as a specialist / teacher

d. Oral / Viva shall be to test the students overall knowledge

ii. THESIS

Every candidate for the degree of M.D., M.S., D.M., M.Ch shall carry out work on an assigned research project under the guidance of a recognised post graduate teacher, the result of which shall be written up and submitted in the form of a Thesis.

Thesis shall be submitted at least six months before the theoretical and clinical / practical examination.

The thesis shall be examined by a minimum of three examiners; one internal and two external examiners, who shall not be the examiners for Theory and Clinical. On acceptance of the thesis by two examiners, the candidate shall appear for the final examination.

iii. THEORY & PRACTICAL

1. The examinations shall be organised on the basis of grading or marking system to evaluate and certify candidates' level of knowledge, skill and competence at the end of the training as per the Medical Council of India norms specified from time to time.

2. A minimum of 50% marks in theory as well as practical separately shall be mandatory for passing the examination.

3. The examination shall be held at the end of 3 years (six academic terms), at the end of 2 ½ years (five academic terms) and at the end of 2 years (four academic terms) for M.S./M.D., D.M./M.Ch. and Diploma respectively, (Academic term means six months training period).

iv. APPOINTMENT OF EXAMINERS

a) All the Post-graduate Examiners shall be recognised Post-graduate Teachers holding recognised Post-graduate qualifications in the subject concerned.

b) For all Post- Graduate Examinations, the minimum number of Examiners shall be ordinarily four, out of which at least two (50%) shall be External Examiners, who shall be invited from other recognised Universities/ Medical Institutes.

Under exceptional circumstances, examinations may be held with 3 (three) examiners provided two of them are external.

v. NUMBER OF CANDIDATES TO BE EXAMINED

The maximum number for candidates to be examined in Clinical/ Practical and Oral on any day shall not exceed 8 (eight) for M.D./M.S. degree, 8 (eight) for diploma, 8 (eight) for post graduate certificate and 3 (three) for D.M./M/Ch examinations.

vi. NUMBER OF EXAMINATIONS.

There shall not be more than two examinations conducted in a year, for any course, with an interval of not less than 4 and not more than 6 months between the two examinations.

ON DEGREES, DIPLOMAS AND CERTIFICATES
(Under Section 26(1) (d) of NEHU Act, 1973.

The following Degrees, Diplomas and Certificates in accordance with conditions, which may be laid down from time to time in each case by an Ordinance or otherwise, will be awarded by the University in accordance with the provisions of the Ordinances and Regulations if any, in each case:

- (i) Research Degrees of Master of Philosophy, Doctor of Philosophy, Doctor of Science, Doctor of Literature and Doctor of Law;
- (ii) Master's Degree in Arts, Sciences, Home Science, Commerce, Education, Law, Agriculture, Management Studies, Pharmacology, Medical Sciences and Engineering;
- (iii) Bachelor's Degree (General and Honours) in Arts, Science, Commerce, Home Science, Pharmacology, Education, Agriculture, Medical Sciences, Engineering and Law;
- (iv) Post Graduate Diploma in special branches of learning or practical skills, like Statistics, Planning, Public Administration, Electronics, Instrumentation and Medical Sciences.
- (v) Diploma in Civil, Mechanical and Electrical Engineering, Electronics, Agriculture, Medical Sciences and such other fields as may be approved by the Academic Council from time to time;
- (vi) Diplomas and Certificates in various Languages;
- (vii) Certificates in Arts, Science, Commerce, Agriculture, Medical Sciences and other courses as may be approved by the Academic Council from time to time;
- (viii) Certificates in special branches of learning or practical skills, technical subjects, foreign languages, Statistics etc.
- (ix) Honorary Degrees.

ANNEXURE - VI**A. ADMISSION, SELECTION AND TRAINING :-**

Admission to the MBBS Course, . - Eligibility Criteria : No Candidates shall be allowed to be admitted to the Medical Curriculum of first year Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery (MBBS) Course unless he/she fulfills the following :

1. Applicant should be a resident Indian National
2. Applicant should have studied and completed their course in the schools located in India in the preceding two years
3. He/She shall complete the age of 17 years on or before 31st December, of the year admission to the MBBS course.
4. He/She has passed qualifying examination as under :-

1. The Higher / Senior Secondary Examination or the Indian School Certificate Examination which is equivalent to 10+2 Higher / Senior Secondary Examination after a period of 12 years study, the last two years of such study comprising Physics, Chemistry, Biology (Botany and Zoology) (which shall include practical tests in these subjects) and with English at a level not less than the core course for English as prescribed by the National Council of Educational Research and Training after introduction of the 10+2+3 educational structure as recommended by the National Committee on Education.
2. The applicant must have passed in the subjects of Physics, Chemistry, Biology (or Botany and Zoology) and English individually and must have obtained a minimum of 50% marks taken together in Physics, Chemistry, Biology / Botany & Zoology at the qualifying examination. For Scheduled Castes (SCs)/ Scheduled Tribes (STs) and Other Backward Classes (OBCs), the minimum marks in the qualifying examination will be 40%.

Applicants who have appeared or will be appearing in the qualifying examination in March / April of that year and whose results have not yet been declared can also apply for admission, if the other eligibility criteria are fulfilled

Note: Marks obtained in Mathematics are not considered for admission to MBBS Course.

B. Training Period and Time Distribution

1. Every student shall undergo a period of certified study extending over 4 ½ academic years divided into 9 semesters, (i.e. of 6 months each) from the date of commencement of his study for the subjects comprising the medical curriculum to the date of completion of examination and followed by one year compulsory rotating

internship. Each semester will consist of approximately 120 teaching days of a hours each college working time, including one hour of lunch.

2. The period of 4 1/2 years is divided into three phases as follows:-

(a) Phase-1 (two semesters) – consisting of Human Anatomy, Physiology including Bio-Physics, Biochemistry and introduction to Community Medicine including Humanities). Besides 60 hours for introduction to Community Medicine including Humanities, rest of the time shall be somewhat equally divided between Anatomy and Physiology plus Biochemistry combined (Physiology 2/3 and Biochemistry 1/3)

(b) Phase-II (3 semester) – consisting of para – clinical/clinical subjects.

During this phase teaching of para-clinical and clinical subjects shall be done concurrently.

The para-clinical subjects shall consist of Pathology, Pharmacology, Microbiology, Forensic Medicine including Toxicology and part of Community Medicine.

The clinical subjects shall consist of all those detailed below in Phase III.

- Out of the time for Para-clinical teaching approximately equal time be allotted to Pathology, Pharmacology, Microbiology and Forensic Medicine and Community Medicine combined (1/3 Forensic Medicine and 2/3 Community Medicine).

(c) Phase-III (continuation of study of clinical subjects for seven semesters after passing Phase-1)

- The clinical subjects to be taught during Phase II and III are Medicine and its allied specialties, Surgery and its allied specialties, Obstetrics and Gynaecology and Community Medicine.
- Besides clinical posting as per schedule mentioned herewith, rest of the teaching hours be divided for didactic lectures, demonstrations, seminars, group discussions, etc. in various subjects.
- The Medicine and its allied specialties training will include General Medicine, Pediatrics, Tuberculosis and Chest, Skin and Sexually Transmitted Diseases, Psychiatry, Radio-diagnosis, Infectious diseases etc. The Surgery and its allied specialties training will include General Surgery, Orthopedics Surgery including Physiotherapy and Rehabilitation, Ophthalmology, Otorhinolaryngology, Anesthesia, Dentistry, Radio-therapy etc. The Obstetrics & Gynecology training will include family medicine, family welfare planning etc.

3. The first 2 semester (approximately 240 teaching days) shall be occupied in the Phase 1 (pre-clinical) subjects and introduction to a broader understanding of the perspectives of medical education leading to delivery of health care. No student shall be permitted to join the Phase II (Pare-clinical/clinical) group of subjects until he has passed in all the Phase 1 (Pre-clinical) subjects for which he will be permitted not more than four chances (actual examination), provided four chances are

completed in three years from the date of enrollment.

4. After passing pre-clinical subjects, 1 ½ year (3 semesters) shall be devoted to para-clinical subjects.

Phase II will be devoted to para-clinical and clinical subjects, along with clinical posting. During clinical phase (Phase III) pre-clinical and para clinical teaching will be integrated into the teaching of clinical subjects where relevant.

3. Didactic lectures should not exceed one third of the time schedule; two third schedule should include practical, clinical or/and group discussions. Learning process should include living experiences, problem oriented approach, case studies and community health care activities.
4. The admission timings and admission process will be completed by 31st of July so that teaching in first semester starts by 1st of August each year.
5. Supplementary examination will be conducted within 3 months so that the students who pass can join the main batch and the failed students will have to appear with the subsequent junior year/batch.

- a. Passing in 1st Professional is compulsory before proceeding to Phase II training. In case a student fails in his 1st Professional examination, he/she is allowed to reappear the paper/papers after 3 months. If he/she passes during the second attempt then he/she is allowed to continue with the Phase II training as a part of his/her original batch. However if he/she fails in the second attempt (i.e. after 3 months), then he/she **will not** be allowed to continue with the Phase II classes and will have to join the junior batch.
- b. A students who fails in the IInd professional examination, will not be allowed to appear in IIIrd Professional examination unless he/she passes all subjects of IInd Professional examination either in supplementary examination after 3 months OR in regular examination.
- c. Passing in IIIrd Professional examination is not compulsory before entering for 8th and 9th semester training, however passing of IIIrd Professional is compulsory for being eligible for Final Professional examination.

- d. During third to ninth semesters, clinical postings of three hours duration daily as specified in the Table is suggested for various departments, after Introductory Course in Clinical Methods in Medicine and Surgery of two weeks each for the whole class.

D. Examination Regulations

Essentialities for qualifying to appear in professional examinations.

The performance in essential components of training are to be assessed, based on:

(1) ATTENDANCE

75% of attendance in a subject for appearing in the examination is compulsory inclusive of attendance in non lecture teaching. i.e. seminars, group discussions, tutorials, demonstrations, practicals, Hospital (Tertiary, Secondary, Primary) postings and bed side clinics, etc.

(2) Internal Assessment :

- a. It shall be based on day to day assessment (see note), evaluation of student assignment, preparation for seminar, clinical case presentation etc.
- b. Regular periodical examinations shall be conducted throughout the course. The number of questions for the examinations is left to the institution
- c. Day to day records should be given importance during internal assessment
- d. Weightage for the internal assessment shall be 20% of the total marks in each subject
- e. Student must secure at least 35% marks of the total marks fixed for internal assessment in a particular subject in order to be eligible to appear in final university examination of that subject.

(3) UNIVERSITY EXAMINATIONS :

- a. Theory papers will be prepared by the examiners as prescribed. Nature of questions will be short answer type/objective type and marks for each part indicated separately. Question papers should preferably be of short structure/objective type.

- b. Practicals/clinicals will be conducted in the laboratories or hospital wards. The objective will be to assess proficiency in skills, conduct of experiment, interpretation of data and logical conclusion. Clinical cases should preferably include common diseases and not esoteric syndromes or rare disorders. Emphasis should be on candidate's capability in eliciting physical signs and their interpretation. **Clinical cases/practicals shall take into account common diseases which the student is likely to come in contact in practice. Rare cases/obscure syndromes, long cases of neurology shall not be put for final examination."**
- c. Viva/oral includes evaluation of management approach and handling of emergencies. Candidate's skill in interpretation of common investigative data, x-rays, identification of specimens, ECG, etc. also is to be evaluated.
- d. The examinations are to be designed with a view to ascertain whether the candidate has acquired the necessary knowledge, minimum skills along with clear concepts of the fundamentals which are necessary for him to carry out his professional day to day work competently. Evaluation will be carried out on an objective basis.
- e. Question papers will be of short structure/objective type.
- f. Clinical cases/ practicals shall take into account common diseases which the student is likely to come in contact in practice. Rare cases/obscure syndromes, long cases of neurology shall not be put for final examination.
- g. During evaluation (both Internal and External) it shall be ascertained if the candidate has acquired the skills.

There shall be one main examination in a year and a supplementary will be held after 3 months after the publication of its results if required. Universities Examinations shall be held as under:-

- **First Professional:- (July)**
- **Second Professional:- (Dec)**
- **Third Professional :- (Dec)**
- **Final Professional :- (Dec)**

Note : Results of all university examinations shall be declared before the start of teaching for next semester.

Pass : In each of the subjects a candidate must obtain 50% in aggregate with a minimum of 50% in Theory including orals and minimum of 50% in Practicals / clinicals.

4. APPOINTMENT OF EXAMINERS:

- a. No person shall be appointed as an examiner in any of the subjects of the Professional examination leading to and including the final Professional examinations for the award of the MBBS degree unless he has taken at least five years previously, a doctorate degree of a recognized university or an equivalent qualification in the particular subject as per recommendation of the Council on teachers' eligibility qualifications and has had at least five years of total teaching experience in the subject concerned in a college affiliated to a recognized university at a faculty position.

- b. There shall be at least four examiners for 100 students, out of whom not less than 50% must be external examiners. Of the four examiners, the senior most internal examiner will act as the Chairman and co-ordinator of the whole examination programme so that uniformity in the matter of assessment of candidates is maintained. Where candidates appearing are more than 100, one additional examiner, for every additional 50 or part thereof candidates appearing, be appointed.
- c. Non medical scientists engaged in the teaching of medical students as whole time teachers, may be appointed examiners in their concerned subjects provided they possess requisite doctorate qualifications and five year teaching experience of medical students after obtaining their postgraduate qualifications. Provided further that the 50% of the examiners (Internal & External) are from the medical qualification stream.
- d. External examiners shall not be from the same university and preferably be from outside the state.
- e. The internal examiner in a subject shall not accept external examinership for a college from which external examiner is appointed in his subject.
- f. External examiners shall rotate at an interval of 2 years.
- g. There shall be a moderation board chaired by the Chairman of BUGS in MBBS or his/her nominee, the Dean of the institute/college and the internal examiner to moderate the question papers.
- h. Except Head of the department of subject concerned in a college/institution, all other with the rank of Associate Professor and above with requisite qualifications and experience shall be appointed internal examiners by rotation in their subjects; provided that where there are no Associate Professors, then an Assistant Professor of 5 years standing as Assistant Professor may be considered for appointment as examiner.
- i. In case an external examiner fails to come on the due date of the examination, then in such exigencies an examiner from NEIGRIHMS will be appointed as a special case.
- j. The grace marks up to a maximum of five marks may be awarded at the discretion of the University to a student who has failed only in one subject but has passed in all other subjects.

E. INTERNSHIP (1st Jan to 31st Dec): Internship is a phase of training wherein a graduate is expected to learn methods/modalities for actual practice of medical and health care and acquire skills under supervision so that he/she may become capable of functioning independently.

F. ASSESSMENT OF INTERNSHIP:

1. The intern shall maintain a record of work which is to be verified and certified by the medical officer under whom he works. Apart from scrutiny of the record of work, assessment and evaluation of training shall be undertaken by an objective approach using situation tests in knowledge, skills and attitude during and at the end of the training. Based on the record of work and date of evaluation, the Dean/Principal shall issue certificate of satisfactory completion of training, following which the University shall award the MBBS degree or declare him eligible for it.

2. Satisfactory completion shall be determined on the basis of the following:-

(1) Proficiency of knowledge required for each case SCORE 0-5.

(2) The competency in skills expected to manage each case: SCORE 0-5

a) Competency for performance of self performance,

b) of having assisted in procedures,

c) of having observed.

3. Responsibility, punctuality, work up of case, involvement in treatment, follow-up report SCORE 0-5

4. Capacity to work in a team (Behaviour with colleagues, nursing staff and relationship with paramedicals). SCORE 0-5

5. Initiative, participation in discussions, research aptitude. SCORE 0-5

A Score of less than 3 in any of above items will represent unsatisfactory completion of internship.

G. Award of Degree:

1. The pass percentage for all students is 50% in theory + viva & practical individually.
2. Those candidates securing $\geq 75\%$ will be awarded Distinction in that particular subject.
3. A Merit List of the first ten candidates will be made and the students will be given certificate of merit indicating the rank (i.e. First Rank, Second Rank, etc.)
4. The University shall issue a provisional MBBS pass certificate on passing the final examination. The MBBS pass certificate will be awarded at the University convocation.
5. The Meghalaya State Medical Council will grant provisional registration to the candidate on production of the provisional MBBS pass certificate. The provisional registration will be for a period of one year. In the event of the shortage or unsatisfactory work, the period of provisional registration and the compulsory rotating internship may be suitably extended by the appropriate authorities.
6. The intern shall be entrusted with clinical responsibilities under direct supervision of senior medical officer of the Institute. They shall not be working independently
7. Interns will not issue a medical certificate or a death certificate or a medicolegal document under their signature.
8. Provided further that for such trainee a certificate of satisfactory completion of training shall be obtained from the relevant administrative authorities which shall be countersigned by the Dean of NEIGRIHMS
9. Adjustment to enable a candidate to obtain training in elective clinical subjects may be made.
10. One year's approved service in the Armed Forces Medical Services, after passing the final MBBS examination shall be considered as equivalent to the pre-registration training detailed above; such training shall, as far as possible, be at the Base/General Hospital.

No. F. 1-19/2005 (CPP II).—In exercise of the power conferred by clause (f) and (g) of Sub-section (1) of Section 20 of the UGC Act, 1956, the University Grants Commission makes the following regulations namely :—

1. Short Title, Application and Commencement :

- 1.1 The Regulations may be called the UGC [Grant of Degrees and Other Awards by Universities] Regulations, 2008;
- 1.2 These shall apply to all Universities established or incorporated by or under a Central Act, a Provincial Act, or a State/Union Territory Act and to all institutions deemed to be Universities under Section 3 of the UGC Act, 1956;
- 1.3 These shall come into force from the date of their publication in the Official Gazette.

2. Definitions :

In these Regulations, unless the context otherwise requires :

- 2.1 "Act" means the University Grants Commission Act, 1956 (Act 3 of 1956);
- 2.2 "Authorities" means authorities like Executive Council and Academic Council, so defined by a University in its Act;
- 2.3 "College" means an institution engaged in higher education and/or research, either established by a University as its constituent unit or is affiliated to it;
- 2.4 "Commission" means the University Grants Commission, established under the Act;
- 2.5 "Convocation" means a ceremonial assembly of a University, normally held for conferring Degrees and other awards to its eligible candidates;
- 2.6 "Government" means the Central Government or the State/Union Territory Government, as the case may be;

2.7 "Graduation Ceremony" means a ceremonial assembly of a College, normally held for distributing Degrees and other awards to its eligible students;

2.8 "University" means a University so recognized by the Commission under Clause (f) of Section 2 of the UGC Act, 1956, or a deemed to be University so declared by notification in the Official Gazette by the Government, on the advice of the Commission under Section 3 of the same Act.

3. Objectives :

These Regulations shall have the following objectives, namely :

- 3.1 To ensure that each University grants Degrees and other awards to its eligible students regularly in every academic year;
- 3.2 To facilitate timely holding of a convocation or adopting any other method, for conferring the Degrees/other awards to eligible students at each University;
- 3.3 To assist the eligible students going for employment, higher studies and/or other opportunities, by giving their Degrees and other awards without delay;
- 3.4 To enhance the quality and standard of the University concerned, through its strict adherence to the academic calendar announced in advance;
- 3.5 To gain the confidence, goodwill and respect of stake holders, particularly students, through timely and orderly functioning of the University.

4. Procedure to be followed :

Each University shall follow the following procedure, namely :

- 4.1 At the beginning of each academic year, the University shall announce its academic calendar, giving the schedules for all its activities during the year;
- 4.2 In addition to the schedules for academic activities like courses and examinations, the calendar shall also include the date/s for Degree awards;
- 4.3 If necessary, the University may schedule Degree awards more often than once in a year and the same shall be included in its academic calendar;
- 4.4 The Degree award date/s shall be within 180 days of the date/s by which the students are expected to qualify and become eligible for them;
- 4.5 The University shall notify a programme for Degree awards at least 30 days before the date/s so fixed, so that the candidates can apply for the same;

- 4.6 The University shall hold a convocation or follow any other method on the date/s so fixed, to confer the Degrees and other awards to eligible students;
- 4.7 If a convocation is held, it shall include the ceremonial aspects, as per the provisions made for them in the University Act, Statutes and/or Ordinances;
- 4.8 If for any reason the convocation is not held, the University shall only give away the Degrees and other awards to the eligible applicants at this time;
- 4.9 The University shall have the power to assign selected Colleges to hold graduation ceremonies for their students on its behalf, on the date/s so fixed;
- 4.10 Such Colleges shall be required to abide by the directions of the University and hold the graduation ceremonies as per the schedule fixed;
- 4.11 In case, Clause 4.8 and 4.9 are followed, it may be necessary for the Authorities to amend the University Statutes, Ordinances and/or Rules;
- 4.12 The University shall furnish an annual return to the Commission on the observance of the above provisions regularly, in the prescribed proforma.

5. Penalty :

- 5.1 In case, a University does not comply with any of the provisions of these Regulations, the Commission shall have the power to impose penalty on the University in the form of fine and take such other action as it may deem fit including recommendation to the Government, after giving due opportunity to the University concerned to be heard.

6. Interpretation :

- 6.1 Any question as to the interpretation of these Regulations shall be decided by the Commission, whose decision shall be final and binding on the University in the matter;
- 6.2 The Commission shall have the power to issue clarifications to remove any doubt, difficulty or anomaly, which may arise in regard to the implementation of these Regulations.

7. Jurisdiction of Courts :

- 7.1 The Courts in the National Capital Territory of Delhi alone shall have the jurisdiction to entertain any disputes/issues arising out of the provisions contained in these Regulations.

THE CENTRAL UNIVERSITIES LAWS (AMENDMENT) ACT, 2008

No. 25 OF 2008

[5th December, 2008.]

An Act further to amend the Banaras Hindu University Act, 1915, the Delhi University Act, 1922, the Jawaharlal Nehru University Act, 1966, the North-Eastern Hill University Act, 1973 and the University of Hyderabad Act, 1974.

BE it enacted by Parliament in the Fifty-ninth Year of the Republic of India as follows.—

CHAPTER I

PRELIMINARY

1. This Act may be called the Central Universities Laws (Amendment) Act, 2008.

CHAPTER II

AMENDMENTS TO THE BANARAS HINDU UNIVERSITY ACT, 1915

ON CONDITIONS OF RESIDENCE OF THE STUDENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY
(Under Section 26(1) (h) of the NEHU ACT, 1973)

Objectives

- 1 :1.** The North Eastern Hill University is primarily a residential University. A large section of its students come from distant places and reside in the campus of the University. The objectives of residence in the halls and lodges are as follows :
- (a) to provide to the students of the University a congenial place to live so that they can devote themselves to pursuit of higher learning;
 - (b) to provide enlightened guardianship to the students during an impressionable age when they are living away from their parents/ guardians;
 - (c) to ensure that students coming from different backgrounds have an opportunity to live together, imbibe a spirit of cooperation and goodwill and acquire broader societal frame;
 - (d) to provide opportunities for co-curricular and extra-curricular activities for all round development or individual personality and for giving expression to their artistic and creative talent; and
 - (e) to develop in the students the capacity to govern their own affairs.

Halls of Residence**2:1. Residence in Campus**

- (a) The University shall maintain such hostels as may be necessary to fulfill the objectives of residence;
- (b) Every hostel shall have a name and a number as the University may assign to it; and
- (c) One hostel shall be under the charge of one or more Warden(s) as decided from time to time.

2:2. Residence off campus

The University may at its discretion approve hostels or lodges for students who do not live either with their parents or approved guardians.

Supervision and Control**3.1 (i) Central Committee on Residence.**

(a) The supervision and control of the residence of all students is vested in the Vice-Chancellor/Pro-Vice-Chancellor. The Dean, Students' Welfare will assist the Vice-Chancellor in performing his function with the help of a Central Committee on Residence.

(b) The Central Committee shall be appointed by the Vice-Chancellor/ Pro-Vice-Chancellor or by such person he may specify on his behalf and shall comprise the following :

- (i) Provost (Convener and Chairman)
- (ii) Proctor
- (iii) Director of Sports,

(iv) 6 Wardens of hostels maintained by the University by seniority, two each from U.G,PG, and Research Scholar.

(c) The term of office of the Central Committee shall be three years.

(d) The functions of the Committee shall be as follows :

- (i) Management, selection and admission of students to University halls of residence and approved lodges as per details in rules;
- (ii) Supervision of the halls of residence and advise the University on matters of policy, etc. relating to their management ;
- (iii) Maintenance of discipline amongst the resident students ;
- (iv) Transfer of a student from one hostel to another; and
- (v) Such other duties as may be assigned by the Vice-Chancellor/Pro-Vice-Chancellor and /or Dean, Students Welfare.

(e) The Committee may admonish a student for misconduct, may impose a fine up to Rs.1000/- on a student at a time, may remove a student residing in a hall of the University, and may declare halls out of bounds for students during the period of suspension.

(f) The Central Committee shall meet as often as necessary and at least twice in every semester. Meetings shall be convened and presided over by the Provost, and 1/3 of its members shall form the quorum.

(g) The Dean, Students' Welfare shall submit the conclusions of the meeting to the Vice-Chancellor who will place it before the Executive Council for its information.

3.2 Provost

The Provost shall be a teacher not below the rank of a reader and shall be appointed by the Vice-Chancellor, on the recommendation of the Dean, Students' Welfare. She/he will work under the general supervision of the Dean, Students' Welfare and shall look after all aspects of management of Halls of Residence maintained by the University. She/he shall be entitled to a remuneration and other privileges as per University norms.

3.3. Warden, Prefect and Local Committee

(a) The management of each hostel/approved lodge and the mess attached to it shall vest in the Warden who will be assisted by the Prefect(s) and a Local Committee which may consist of :

(i) Warden – Chairman.

(ii) Prefect(s)

(iii) Three students of the Hostel, one of whom shall be the mess manager/secretary.

(b) The Local Committee shall be appointed by the Warden and its term of office shall be one year.

(c) One or more Prefects may be appointed by the Warden who shall assign him/her such duties as he/she may deem proper for the smooth functioning of the hostei.

(d) The Prefect shall hold office for one year and shall be entitled to free accommodation in the hostel during the period of office.

4. Admissison to Hostels Maintained by the University

4.1. ELIGIBILITY AND PROCEDURE

- (a) All students registered for full-time programmes of study, and who are not employed anywhere, are eligible to apply for accommodation in the hostels of the University. Students on projects sponsored by organisations like UGC, CSIR, ICAR, ICSSR, DST, DBT, etc. in the university on a salary not exceeding the amount of UGC, CSIR, ICAR, ICSSR, DST, DBT fellowship, shall also be eligible for allotment of accommodation in the hostels.
- (b) As soon as a student ceases to satisfy any one of the conditions in (a) above, he will become ineligible for hall/hostel accommodation.
- (c) Students desirous of residing in the University hostel may apply in the prescribed form after admission to the academic departments.
- (d) The Heads of the departments may forward all hostel applications of selected candidates for admission to their respective departments to the Dean, Students' Welfare. The applications shall be scrutinised by the Central Committee which will allot the hostel to each applicant.
- (e) Students joining the University for the first time and those from distant places will be given preference for hostel accommodation.
- (f) Hostel accommodation will be allotted for one academic year at a time. Every student shall submit a fresh application for admission to the hostel in every subsequent year of study. The applications should reach the Warden of the hostel concerned at least 15 days before the commencement of the academic session each year. Re-admission will be permitted only after the resident is admitted to a programme of study and after furnishing proof of having paid all hostel/tuition dues.

5. Appointments, Powers and Functions of Wardens

5.1. Appointment

Wardens of Hostels and Wardens in-charge of lodges outside the Campus shall be appointed by the Vice-Chancellor on the recommendation of the Dean, Students' Welfare for a period of two years and they shall be eligible for reappointment.

5.2. Powers and functions of Wardens

- (a). The Wardens of Hostels shall perform such duties as are assigned to them by the Vice-Chancellor from time to time and they shall function in consultation with the Dean, Students' Welfare/Provost.
- (b) Subject to the guidelines of the Central Committee, the Warden shall allot rooms to the students assigned to him/her, maintain a list of students along with permanent addresses of guardians and such other information as may be required, in a form prescribed by the appropriate authority.
- (c) In addition to the specific duties assigned by the Vice-Chancellor, the Wardens shall perform the following duties:
 - (i) Welfare of, and discipline, amongst the residents in the hall and to maintain daily record of the resident students such as students present each day, students absent from the Hall together with reasons for absence;
 - (ii) Oversee health, hygiene and general life of the students in the Hostels and to ensure that the students observe the Regulations and discipline in accordance with the rules framed thereof;
 - (iii) Report to the Central Committee all cases of misbehavior, indiscipline and illness of students residing in his/her hostel;

(iv) Safe custody and maintenance of such properties of the concerned hostel as are entrusted to him/her and for their repairs within the funds allotted and norms laid down by the University authorities for the same.

- (d) The Wardens shall have the right to inspect hostel rooms.
- (e) The Wardens shall have administrative control over the staff assigned to the hostel.
- (f) Hard furnished residential accommodation will be provided to a Warden on rent-free basis for the period of his/her Wardenship, and he/she shall be entitled to such allowance/special pay as the University may decide.

5.3 Remuneration

The Warden shall be entitled to such allowances and privileges as may be decided by the University from time to time.

6. Miscellaneous

- (a) All students of the University, residing in and off campus, shall be under the disciplinary control of the Vice-Chancellor, and of the authorities of the University.
- (b) The conditions of admission, accommodation and the organisation of mess in the hostels shall be in accordance with the rules which may be framed in this regard by the University from time to time.

NORTH-EASTERN HILL UNIVERSITY RULES

RU-3

Admission to and Management of Hostels (Under Ordinance OD-4)

Approved by the 81st A. C. (29.5.2009)

1. Admission

Admission to the hostels of the University and their management shall be made as per the following rules:

- 1.1 Admission to hostels maintained maintained by the University shall be in accordance with the provisions of the Ordinance on Conditions of Residence of Students of the University.
- 1.2 Admission to both PG and UG students to hostels shall be made once a year after commencement of 1st and 3rd semester.
- 1.3 Admission of research scholars to hostels shall be a continuous process. The Provost shall continuously update the waiting list of research scholar applicants for hostel accommodation and allot the seats accordingly.
- 1.4 Admission to hostels shall be on the basis of merit i.e. performance in the qualifying examination or the class/programme to which admitted. Graduates of North-Eastern Hill University shall be assigned a weightage of 10% marks. Graduates who are from Universities other than NEHU but who are domiciles of Meghalaya shall be assigned a weightage of 10% marks.
- 1.5 (a) The distribution of hostel seats for the P.G. /U.G. students shall be as follows:
 - (i) 47% of the hostel seats shall be open to all ;
 - (ii) 50% of the total hostel seats shall be reserved for SC/ST students (*40% for SC/ST students from Meghalaya and 10% for SC/ST students from outside Meghalaya. Unfilled seats in any one of these two categories will automatically get transferred to the other*);
 - (iii) 3% of the hostel seats shall be reserved for physically challenged students.
 - (iv) Application under (ii) and (iii) are required to submit necessary documents in support of their claims. Physically challenged students will have to submit a certificate to that effect from a medical officer of the university.
 - (v) All of the authorized seats under category (ii) and (iii) above shall stand converted to category (i) if unfilled.
 - (vi) Applicants whose permanent residence is in Shillong urban agglomeration shall be considered only if seats are available in category (i) and (ii). However, physically challenged students applying for a hostel seat irrespective of their residence shall be considered under category (iii).
- (b) Available seats in R.S. hostels shall be allotted on the same basis as in 1.5(a)

No research scholar who is employed (except those on study leave) shall be eligible to hostel accommodation. Scholars on study leave may be allotted a seat for a period not exceeding the period granted as leave.

(c) Married students may apply for married student's accommodation subject to availability of such recommendation. Allotment to such hostels shall be made on first-cum-first served basis. Fees for such accommodation shall be different from the hostels and determined by University from time to time

- 1.6 All hostel fees, including University caution and mess caution money, should be paid in advance for

one year and the fee counterfoil submitted to the Warden prior to occupying the hostel room / seat. Anyone found violating this shall forfeit his/her hostel seat.

- 1.7 Any hosteller who is subsequently found to be a working man/woman (and not on study leave) shall forfeit his/her hostel seat. A working man/woman should produce an attested copy of his/her leave letter along with the application for hostel accommodation. The original certificate should also be produce at the time of admission for verification
- 1.8 The provost shall permit transfer of allotment from one hostel to another only in exceptional cases.

2. Duration of Residence

- 2.1 Seats shall be allotted for one academic year at a time, to be renewed on application in the prescribed form.
- 2.2 Those desirous of an extension should apply in the prescribed form at least one month prior to the expiry of present allotment, their application being forwarded by the respective Head of the Department and Warden.
- 2.3. The maximum duration of residence shall be as follows:
 - (a) Two academic years (4 semesters) for P.G. students and M. Phil. students.
 - (b) Five academic years (10 semesters) extendable by one year (two semesters) for Ph. D. scholars or submission of thesis/expiry of their registration, whichever is earlier.
 - (c) Four academic years (8 semesters) for U.G. students and five academic years (10 semesters) for Law students.
- 2.4. U.G. and P.G. students are required to vacate their rooms within fifteen days of completion of their final semester/ end-term examination and M. Phil. and Ph. D. scholars within 15 days of submission of dissertation/thesis. Those who discontinue their studies/research shall be required to vacate their rooms immediately.
- 2.5. Ordinarily no U.G. or P.G. students shall be permitted to stay in the hostel during winter vacation. The Provost, however, at his/her discretion, may permit a student to stay during the winter vacation on the basis of application received from the student providing reasons and duration of stay during the vacation.

3. Conditions of Residence

- 3.1. All hostellers should be back in their room before the "roll call" at 9 p.m.
- 3.2 During "study hours", common rooms shall be closed and strict silence shall be observed.
- 3.3 (a) The warden may grant permission for late stay only on a written request from the authority concerned. Residence granted late stay permission should be issued passes in which the time of return to the hostel shall be indicated.

Note: Late stay for the purpose of these Rules shall solely be for the purpose of research/laboratory work/attending University functions on the recommendation of the Supervisor.

- (b) The Warden may grant permission for overnight stay on a written request from the parents/local guardians of the hostellers. Such permission shall be granted only once a month. Residents granted overnight stay permission should be issued passes in which the date and time of return to the hostel shall be indicated.
- 3.4 A research scholar shall be permitted by the Warden to stay out for a specified length of time on a written request duly recommended by the concerned Supervisor.
- 3.5 A research scholar who does not occupy his/her hostel seat for a continuous period of three months or more shall ordinarily forfeit his/her seat.
- 3.6 A hosteller who stays out for any length of time without the written permission of the Warden shall forfeit his/her seat.
- 3.7 Visitors of the opposite gender will be allowed entry only up to the Visitors' Room. Wardens shall

have the right to deny entry to any visitor into their respective hostels.

- 3.8. A resident of a hostel may accommodate one guest in his/her room with prior permission of the warden. All appropriate conditions laid down under these rules shall also apply to a guest. The charges for such accommodation and mess fee etc shall be decided by the Central Committee on Residence from time to time.
- 3.9. Guests of hostellers will be provided accommodation only on a written permission from the Warden.
- 3.10. No guest shall reside in a hostel for more than 3 days in a semester. A hosteller who is found to accommodate a guest for more than three days is likely to forfeit his/her seat.
- 3.11. Residents shall be personally responsible for the care and cleanliness of the rooms allotted to them. They shall also be responsible for the safe upkeep of the fitting in the rooms, furniture and other items supplied to them. More than the prescribed furniture will not be allowed in the hostel rooms.
- 3.12. No resident shall remove any property from the common room or dining room to his or her own room.
- 3.13. Use of unauthorized electrical or electronic appliances in the rooms are not permitted.
- 3.14. While the usual and necessary precautions for security of residents would be taken, the University, however, shall not be responsible any loss of private property of the residents of the hostels. Residents should take measures for the safe keeping of their property. Residents must provide their own locks for their allotted rooms.
- 3.15. The University reserves the right to withhold the results of any semester/course of a hosteller who does not clear all hostel fees/dues in time. The Provost, through the Dean, Students' Welfare, shall bring such cases to the knowledge of the Controller of Examinations for necessary actions.
- 3.16. Keeping of pets/animals in the hostel is strictly prohibited.
- 3.17. The University reserves the right to take immediate occupation of any hostel room/seat that has been forfeited.
- 3.18. Fixed line telephone connection shall not be permitted in hostel rooms.
- 3.19. The use of television sets in hostel rooms shall not be permitted.
- 3.20. Personal computers may be installed in the hostel rooms only on a written permission from the Warden.
- 3.21. Consumption of alcoholic beverages and narcotic substances is prohibited. Any resident found violating this rule shall be immediately expelled.

4. Hostel Mess

- 4.1. All bonafide students and research scholars of the University who have been allotted seats in the University hostel are required to join the hostel mess.
- 4.2. As a special case, the Warden may allow associate membership to the hostel mess to the following:
 - (a) Casual students who pursue special courses in the University. These students can join the mess for the duration of their course.
 - (b) Visiting non-resident students and research scholars.
- 4.3. A student/Research Scholar who ceases to be such shall no longer be eligible for membership of the hostel mess.
- 4.4. Each hostel shall have a mess of its own manned by the staff appointed by the University or may be outsourced. Students residing in a particular hostel shall be members of the mess located in that hostel only. In the event that a hostel has no mess of its own, the students residing in that hostel maybe permitted to join a mess of another hostel with the permission of the Wardens of both hostels.
- 4.5. The Mess shall be managed by a Mess Committee to be composed of the following and appointed

by the Warden.

- (a) One Chairman/Chairperson (Warden-Ex-officio)
- (b) One Secretary
- (c) One Treasurer
- (d) Members

5. Recreation

5.1 Recreation facilities shall be provided in each hostel. Every hostel shall have their recreational facilities to be decided by a Committee consisting of the Provost, Warden and the Registrar and to be provided by the University through the office of the Dean Students' Welfare.

5.2 No equipment of personal nature, like table tennis bats, rackets etc., shall be supplied.

5.3 (a) Every hostel shall have a Sport Committee to consist of the following and appointed by the warden:

- i) One Chairman/Chairperson (Warden-Ex-officio)
- ii) One Secretary-senior resident
- iii) Members
- iv) Prefect(s) (Ex-officio)
- v) Four hostellers, two each from the 1st/2nd and 3rd/4th semester.

(b) The term of office of all Committee members, except the Ex-officio members, shall be one semester, and shall be eligible for reappointment.

(c) The Secretary of the Committee shall be responsible for the organization of all recreational and sport activities in the hostels. He/She shall maintain stock register of all equipment and shall be responsible for the maintenance and safe custody.

6. Maintenance of Discipline

6.1 Subject to the provision of the Rules of Discipline framed under Section 32(5) of the Statute, all power relating to the maintenance of discipline and proper conduct of resident in the hostel shall vest in their respective Warden.

6.2 Ragging in any form is an offence and is strictly prohibited. Any resident found indulging into such act(s) shall be punished as per the existing laws.

7. Miscellaneous

7.1 All Wardens shall maintain a detail profile with photograph of the residents. A copy of the profile shall be forwarded to the Dean of Students' Welfare immediately after admission to the hostel is made.

7.2 The Dean Students' Welfare may allot rooms in the hostel to visiting non-resident students and research scholars during vacation. However, the duration of stay of such person shall not exceed the vacation.

7.3 Notwithstanding anything contained in these Rules, the University reserved the right to have any or all of the hostels vacated on a thirty six hour notice to the residents.

7.4. Preference shall be given to students hailing from distant places.

Dear Professor Tandon,

This is in continuation to this office letter No F.24-9/2008(CU) dated 5th December, 2008 about the intimation of XI Plan allocation of your University. I am grateful to you for the cooperation extended for furnishing the information required by the UGC.

Based on the priorities indicated by you, as well as the availability of funds from Govt. of India, UGC has approved the final XI Plan allocation of Rs.12380.00 lakhs under General Development Grant. However, the release of grant would be subject to availability of funds received from Govt. of India.

The XI plan allocation under General Development Grant for your University along with the detailed breakup is given in the enclosed statement duly signed by the undersigned. A copy of the Visiting Committee Report has already been given to you in the meeting held in the UGC Office.

The UGC has already finalized the guidelines for the schemes to be operated in the XI Plan. These guidelines are posted on the UGC website www.ugc.ac.in. I would request you to browse the UGC website regularly to keep yourself abreast of the latest XI Plan guidelines finalized by the UGC.

The University may follow the procedure for constructions of buildings strictly as prescribed in the UGC guidelines. The Building Committee should be constituted as per UGC guidelines and the constitution of the Committee should be intimated to UGC.

The University may follow strictly the Government of India/UGC's guidelines regarding implementation of the reservation policy [both vertical (for SCs, STs & OBCs) and horizontal (for persons with disability etc.)] in teaching and non-teaching posts.

The teaching posts as approved by the UGC in the existing departments may be filled up in a phased manner as per requirement of the University. The teaching posts for the new proposed departments may be filled up on the basis of intake of students admitted in the University.

I hope the university must have also initiated the Academic Reforms as already circulated by the UGC vide its D.O.No.F.1-2/2008 (XI Plan) dated 31st January, 2008. It may also be ensured that the university has adopted the University Grants Commission (Minimum Standards and Procedure for award of M.Phil./Ph.D. Degree), Regulations, 2009.

In the end, I would request you to ensure that the utilization of the grants received by the university shall be submitted to the UGC in time to enable smooth management of funds and to avoid unnecessary audit objections.

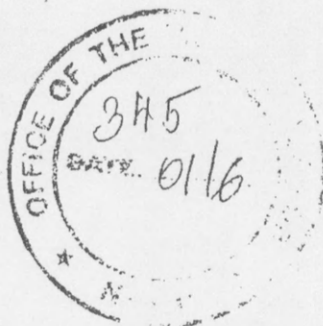
