

5:1: Statutes, Ordinances, Regulations and
Rule 5:1:1(1)

(1) Admission of Physically handicapped to
the P.G. Programmes.

For the purpose of determining the Physically handicapped for consideration of admission to the P.G. programmes, the Academic Council in its 51st meeting decided to accept the following Government of India criteria with the inclusion of the deaf, dum-b etc.

" The orthopaedically handicapped - The orthopaedically handicapped are those who have a minimum of 40% of Physically defect or deformity which causes an interference with the normal functioning of the bones, muscles and joints"

(ii) Admission criteria for admission to
P.G. Departments.

Due to certain problems faced while considering admission to the P.G. programmes as per the existing provisions, a proposal for amendment of the relevant Regulation was placed before the Academic Council as per Annexure--A.

The Academic Council resolved to approve the proposed amendment but the 10% reserved seats under Clause 4(iii) if unutilised will stand converted to the open category and that the existing provisions of Clause 9 may remain. The rest of the proposed amendment was approved by the Academic Council.

The matter is placed before the Council for consideration.

1. The number of seats available for admission into each department will depend on infrastructural facilities available.
2. Only those candidates who have passed a Three Year Degree Course in the relevant subject shall ordinarily be considered for admission to the Master Degree Course. However, subject to availability of seats upto ten percent of the seats may be assigned to students from other disciplines. The number of seats for other disciplines in the inter-disciplinary subjects, such as Education, Sociology, Anthropology may be increased upto fifty percent subject to availability of seats. It is also provided that if teaching of honours in a subject has not been sufficiently developed within the jurisdiction of the University, or in any unit in particular, seats in the concerned Departments may be filled in a manner as may be decided by the University.
3. A Candidate with 50% marks in B.Ed may also apply for admission to M.A. Education Course only.
4. The distribution of authorised seats in the Post-Graduate Course in the University shall be as follows:
 - i) Open Category 45%
 - ii) Reserved for SC/ST candidates 50%
 - iii) Discretionary seats with the Vice Chancellor 10%

Note: The discretionary seats will relate to special cases like students nominated by the Central Government/Unrepresented Backward Areas/Physically handicapped/Outstanding Sportsmen/Sports-women and children of NEHU employees with all India Transfer Liability.

Annexure - B

5. In determining interse priority from amongst those claiming to hail from backward area the level of literacy obtaining in that area may be taken as the guiding factor. For out-standing sportsmen/sportswomen, the level of participation at the Inter-University, State or at Nationals, within the last three years only shall be taken into account. Proficiency in performing Arts should be supported by suitable documents.
6. Departments will prepare consolidated list of all applicants or the total number of seats authorised by the University. 45% of the seats shall be filled up by merit and shall include SC/ST students who by merit can figure in the open list. For the remaining 45% seats, a list of candidates belonging to SC/ST will be prepared and the seats will be filled up from those candidates in order or merit.
7. Any or all of the discretionary seats and 10% of the authorised seats under category (iii) above will stand converted to category (ii) if unfilled. (Provided that in such cases, the total reservation of seats should not exceed 50%).
8. Departments may, if they consider necessary, conduct written test/interview for admission to the P.G. Programme in accordance with Ordinance OC-7. Performance of a candidate in the Under-graduate Course together with eligibility test, if any, shall be taken into consideration while preparing the merit list of students. Weightage for eligibility test/interview shall, however, not exceed 50%.

Departments will prepare consolidated list of all applicants or the total number of seats authorised by the University, 40% of the seats shall be filled by merit and shall include SC/ST students who by merit can figure in the open list. For the remaining 50% seats, a list of candidates belonging to SC/ST will be prepared and the seats will be filled up from those candidates in order of merit.
7. Any of all the authorised seats under category (iii) above will stand converted to category (ii) if unfilled.

9. In case of all internal students i.e. students who have graduated from Colleges affiliated to or maintained by the University, the percentage of marks obtained in the subject concerned shall be raised by 10 marks. In case of those candidates who have not offered the subject in the Honours no such weightage shall be given and their marks in the Honours subject without weightage shall be taken into account.
10. All departments shall constitute Admission Committee and assign them specific responsibility. Students who have already obtained a Master's Degree from the University or any other University, will be considered for admission only if there is any vacancy after considering all eligible candidates seeking first admission, in respect of such candidates too, the general criteria of marks obtained at Honours/Major level will be considered.

9. In case of all internal students i.e. students who have graduated from Colleges affiliated to or maintained by the University, the percentage of marks obtained in the subject concerned shall be raised by 15 marks flat.

5:3 Research - 5:3:1(1)

- (1) Recognition of NERIST as a Research Institute and some of the teachers as Supervisors for Ph.D Programme.

On the request of NERIST, the Academic Council through its resolution No: EC: 48: 94: 5: 03: (i) had appointed an inspection team to assess the facilities available at NERIST for recommendation as a Research Institute and also to recognise some as Teachers/Supervisors for Ph.D programmes.

The Committee appointed for the purpose consisting of Prof. A. L. Verma as Chairman, Prof. S. N. Bhat, Prof. S. S. Khare, Prof. R. S. Tripathy, Prof. L. K. Jha as Members had visited the Institute from 21st to 24th September, 95 of who, only Prof. F. K. Jha could not join the team and had recommended as follows:-

1. The NERIST, Nirjuli may be recognised as Research Institute to conduct the Ph.D programmes.
2. The teachers listed in the Report of the Committee (Annexure-'A') in the Departments of Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics and Applied Science (Forestry) be recognised to guide the Ph.D programmes as per provisions in our University Ordinance No, OC-4 on Ph.D programmes.

The recommendation of the Inspection team was approved by the Academic Council in its meeting held on 2/3.11.95 and the matter is now placed before the Council for consideration.

5:6 Establishment of new Deptts/Centres/Courses

5:6:1(1)

- (1) Introduction of Major in Physics, Chemistry Mathematics, Zoology and Botany in Sankardev College.

In accordance of the decision of the 50th Academic Council meeting, Sankardev College was re-inspected for the purpose of considering grant of provisional affiliation for Major in Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Zoology and Botany.

After considering the report of the 2nd Inspection, the Academic Council in its 51st meeting decided to approve the recommendations of the Inspection team for grant of provisional affiliation.

The matter is placed before the Council for consideration.

5:6:2(1)

- (ii) Introduction of a course on Environment as a compulsory subject at UG and P.G. levels

In its 87th meeting, the Executive Council had decided to have a Common course on Environment Science for the U.G. Level in lieu of the Foundation Course. For the P.G. Level, the Executive Council suggested that every Department will frame its own course on Environment awareness as a compulsory paper.

As desired by the Executive Council, the comments of the Academic Council were sought and the Academic Council in its 51st meeting approved the decision so far the U.G. level, is concerned. For the P.G. level, the Academic Council decided to have a common course for all the P.G. Departments and a Committee has been constituted to frame the syllabus.

The matter is placed before the Executive Council for consideration.

5:7: Affiliation etc: 5:7:1(1)

- (1) Affiliation cases approved by the Vice-Chancellor and ratified by the Academic Council.

In its meeting held on 2.11.95, the Academic Council ratified the action taken by the Vice-Chancellor in approving grant of affiliation to the following colleges for the purpose mentioned against each.

The Academic Council also decided that Synod College and Govt. Aizawl College be inspected again after one year to see whether the conditions laid down by the Inspection Team have been met.

1. Synod College, Shillong - Introduction of Major in Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Botany and Zoology.
2. Seng Khasi College, Shillong - Introduction of Major in English, Political Science, Khasi (Elect.), History, Philosophy, and Education.
3. Govt. Aizawl College - Introduction of Major in Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Botany, Zoology

The Council also re-iterated its earlier decision for complete informations on qualifications of teachers indicating the percentage of marks in Master's Degree and Date of joining. The proforma of the Inspection should also contain the number of teaching staff for each subject/the concerned subject.

The matter is placed before the Council for consideration.

5:8: Others - 5:8:1(1)

- (1) Formula for scaling of marks between Major and non-Major Degree holders for considering admission to the Post Graduate Programmes.

The recommendations of the Committee (constituted as per Academic Council decision) contained in the Annexure-'A' was considered at the 51st meeting of the Academic Council held on 2/3.11.95. The Academic Council approved the formula of the Committee and also decided that the formula as applicable to NEHU non-major students be made applicable to other non-major students.

The matter is placed before the Council for consideration.

Recommendation of the Committee on the formula for scaling of marks between Major/ Non-Major Degree holders for admission to Post-Graduate programmes.

In accordance with the Academic Council Resolution No.AC:45:92:5:03(iii) a Committee was appointed to suggest a formula for scaling of marks between Major and Non-Major Degree holders for purpose of admission to the Post-Graduate programmes.

The Major Degree holders are examined on 800 marks in the subject concerned while the Non-Major Degree holders are examined on 300/400 marks (in Arts, Commerce and Science subjects respectively). For purpose of admission it would be natural to attach higher weightage to the Major Degree holders over the Non-Major Degree holders.

However, the Academic Council felt the need of keeping the door open for admission of very good non-major Degree holders also for admission to Post-Graduate programmes and accordingly it was felt that a suitable formula should be worked out to determine this equation.

To this end the Committee met on 25.2.94 and 17.10.95 and deliberated on the basis for proper scaling technique to be followed. Some of the points highlighted were :-

1. The level of difficulty in securing marks increases at an increasing rate as one goes nearer to the total marks of the paper.
2. This difficulty sets in earlier (at about 65%) in Arts subjects. In other words, it is usually difficult to obtain marks over 65 % in Arts subjects while in Science subjects the same degree of difficulty may set in at about 75% to 80%. Keeping this view, the number of papers in Arts subject be scaled up by a factor of 1.33 to make it equitable to number of papers in Science subject.
3. The level of difficulty in securing marks is proportionately more in major examination as the examinees have to appear in 8 papers of relatively more depth while in non-major subjects an examinee appears in 3/4 papers only which are of relatively less depth.

4. A major degree holder has an advantage in coping up with the P.G. Course while a non-major degree holder has a deficiency of about 4 to 5 papers since the Post-Graduate programmes begin where major course ends up. As a matter of fact, P.G. programmes are built on the foundation of training given at major degree level. Therefore, only those students from general stream should be encouraged to join P.G. programme who have exhibited a high degree of aptitude in the concerned subject good enough to cope up and compensate for the above mentioned deficiency.

In view of the above consideration, the Committee devised the following formula for establishing the equivalent relationship between major and non-major degree holders for the purpose of admission to P.G. programmes.

Scaling factor (F) :

$$F = \sqrt{\frac{\text{No. of papers offered in major subject}}{\text{No. of papers offered in general subject}}}$$

approximated upto the 1st decimal place. This works out to be 1.4 for the degree holders of NEHU.

However, the applicants from other Universities may have five, six, seven, eight or even ^{no.} more of papers in major course. For them the scaling factor would be :-

The Committee recommends that all applicants for admission to F.G. programmes may be first assigned scaled percentage according to the above formula and then the merit list be prepared by comparing the scaled percentage (creating order relation on scaled percentage) and rest of the admission procedure be as per ordinance.

For further clarity the following detailed conversion table may be referred to :-

(ii) Duty leave case

In its 51st meeting held on 2/3.11.1995, the Academic Council considered the recommendations of a Sub-Committee of the Dean's Committee regarding provisions for Duty leave.

The proposal has evolved after the Dean's Committee had considered the comments of the Heads of Department, the UGC instructions in the matter and also the Report of an earlier Committee.

The Academic Council decided to approve the recommendations of the Sub-Committee as per Annex-A and to have the provisions recommended in the relevant Ordinance.

The matter is placed before the Council for consideration.

Minutes of the Meeting of the Committee on "Duty Leave"

A meeting of the Committee on "Duty Leave" was held on 21st June, 1995 at 1.30 p.m. in the office of the Dean, School of Economics, Management and Information Sciences. The following members attended the meeting.

1. Prof. J.C. Binwal (In Chair)
2. Prof. A.C. Sinha, Dean, School of Social Sciences.
3. Prof. K.S. Lyngdoh, Dean, School of Humanities and Education.
4. Prof. S.N. Bhat, Dean, School of Physical Sciences.

Prof. P.K. Mishra had communicated in advance of his inability to attend the meeting.

The Committee considered the report of Prof. C.S. Shastri's Committee as well as the comments received on the report from the various Heads of the Departments. After discussing the report and the comments at length, the Committee arrived at the following decisions:

- 1) It was unanimously agreed that there was need for a provision of "Duty Leave" under Ordinance OE:6. As such it was resolved that the Ordinance may be amended. Item No.1.(1). (i) of the Ordinance, after amendment, should be made to read as follows:

1.(i). The following kinds of leave will be admissible to permanent teachers:

(i) Leave Treated as duty.

(a) Casual Leave

(b) Special Casual Leave

(c) Duty Leave.

- 2) The Committee found the provision of "Short Term Duty Leave" as suggested by Prof. Shastri's Committee to be a replica of Special Casual Leave and decided to drop it. However, it was felt that the provision of ten days Special Casual Leave in the existing Ordinance was not adequate enough to meet the various academic commitments of the teachers. It was, therefore, resolved, to recommend its extension from 10 to 15 days by amending the relevant clause. As such, the clause No.3.(1)(i) should be amended to read as follows:

"Special Casual Leave, not exceeding fifteen days in an academic year, may be granted to a teacher".

- 3) It was also decided that clause "No.4. Deleted" in the Ordinance should be substituted by "Duty Leave".
- 4) The Committee approved the following draft for clause No. 4. in the Ordinance:

Duty Leave 4. (i) Duty Leave, not exceeding 90 days at a time excluding journey days, may be granted to a permanent teacher:-

- (a) to undertake collaborative research programmes and training programmes with the institutions within and outside the Country approved by the University under Ordinance OB:8 on the Scheme of Exchange of Teachers and Experts.
- (b) to undertake collaborative research programme under UGC's/CSIR/DST/DAE/ICSR/ICHA/IIA etc. Schemes approved by the University.
- (c) to undertake research/study programme when a teacher has been selected/sponsored by agencies like Association of Commonwealth Universities/ Fullbright/DST/INSA/JNARC/EC etc. for a specific period and the conditions of the Selection/Sponsorship include deputation with full pay and allowances.

(ii) Duty Leave will be sanctioned by the Vice-Chancellor.

(iii) The application for Duty Leave will be recommended by the Head and forwarded by the Dean to the Vice-Chancellor after taking into account the academic needs of the department/ Centre. While recommending the application, the Head of the Department will specify that alternative arrangements for the academic duties of the faculty member concerned will be made, without asking for a substitute/ extra academic position.

- 5) The Committee also considered the matter, as referred to it of payment of salary to teachers enjoying fellowship/Scholarship exceeding the salary drawn by the incumbent in the parent institution.

The Committee could not find it tenable as the Scholarships/fellowships awarded by foreign agencies are just enough to meet the maintenance costs. Further maintenance costs vary from country to country depending upon the price-index. It was, therefore, resolved that the Scholarships/Fellowships meant for maintenance cannot be equated with salaries. It was also resolved that since payment under Scholarships/Fellowships awarded by internal agencies comes under the category of honorarium it cannot be treated as salary.

The meeting ended with a vote of thanks to the Chair.

50. In reply to Q.No.35 (a&b), it has been stated that JMI University has 239 houses but none of them has been allotted to SC/ST. In other Central Universities, houses allotted to SC/ST are to the level of 5% in IGNOU, 10% in Hyderabad University, 5% to 10% in JNU, 6 to 7.2% in AMU, 7.5% to 15% in Pondicherry University and 15% for SCs and 7.5% for STs in BHU and viswa Bharati NEHU has stated that there is no reservation for SCs/STs in Government accommodation. In case of Delhi University reply is awaited.

- (a) Please state the reasons for non-implementation of reservation in government accommodation in JMI University and NEHU ?
- (b) What are the reasons for providing different percentage of reservation in government accommodation in Central Universities ?
- (c) Delhi University may please furnish the total number of government accommodation vis-a-vis accommodation provided to SC/ST employees and whether any percentage is reserved for SC/ST employees.

R U L E S F O R A L L O T M E N T O F R E S I D E N C EEXISTING RULEClause 5.ALLOTMENT OF RESIDENCE:

Same or otherwise provided in these Rules, the allotment of residence shall be made by the Residence Allotment Committee after observance of the following :

(i) Allotment shall be made strictly according to the "Allotment Seniority" as per Appendix-II.

(ii) No residence of high type shall be allotted to an employees of the University than one is entitled to. However, if one request for a type lower than one's entitlement, one will be considered for allotment for that type of considering one's seniority in the University as per Appendix-II. Provided that if one is allotted a higher quarter may apply for a quarter of a type lower than one's entitlement it may be considered if it does not affect the interest of the employees in the lower cadre who are entitled to that quarter.

(iii) An employees, who is on approved absence may authorise a member of his family or another employee whose name shall be communicated to the administration before the allotment, to comply with the time limit prescribed for acceptance of allotment etc.

(iv) If any employees fails to accept the allotment of residence within fifteen days or fails to take possession of the residence after acceptance within one month from the date of receipt of the letter of allotment, the allotment shall stand automatically cancelled and shall be deemed to have been surrendered by the allottee.

(v) An employee after surrender of an allotted accommodation if entitlement may apply again for another accommodation. However, the allotment seniority of such an employee will be counted from the date of surrender or deemed surrender of the allotment.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTClause 5.ALLOTMENT OF RESIDENCE :

Some or other-wise provided in these Rules, the allotment of residence shall be made by the Residence Allotment Committee after observance of the following :

- (ii) Recovery of licence fee from employees of Pachhunga University College.

In the matter of recovery of licence fee from employees, the 79th Meeting of EC vide Resosution No.EC:79:93:04:(i) had resolved that the question of providing rent free and hard furnished accommodation, payment of licence fee and HRA on the basis of plinth area to the teachers of the Shillong Campus should be referred to the Legal Adviser and to obtain his views and the same forwarded to the UGC for its consideration.

Subsequently, the views of the Legal Adviser was duly communicated to the UGC vide letter as at Annexure-'A' and reminder as at Annexure-'B'. The reply from UGC is still awaited.

In this connection, the PUCTA has represented to the University to stop the realisation of licence fee from the teachers of the said college numbering 23(twenty three) quarters who are residing in the Luangmual Govt. Complex which have been provided by the Govt. of Mizoram about 10 years ago. These teachers including employees of the Govt. of Mizoram who are residing in this complex have been required to pay the licence fee since November, 1992 as per Mizoram Govt. Order No.0.11028/190, BPD/8 dt.27.10.92 (Annexure-'C'). This has been strongly resented by them in view of the fact that as per the terms and conditions of advertisement made by NEHU for appointing teachers, hard free furnished quarters have been assured by the University in lieu of HRA.

Since the matter in respect of payment of licence fee by the teachers of the University residing in the Shillong campus has been kept in abeyance, hence as a sequel to this, the case of the EUC may be decided in the same context. The committee may also consider the alternative modality of payment of licence fee to the Govt. of Mizoram and its effective date be determined.

Sir,

Kindly refer to your letter No.F.1-23/87/NP-1/GU dated 14.2.93 wherein the decision of the commission was conveyed that "No HRA based on plinth area" is admissible to the teachers of this University. The teachers are not happy with this decision and are demanding that those who are staying outside the campus in rented houses or in their own houses and paid HRA equivalent to their entitled plinth area.

It may be recalled that Rent Free and Hard Furnished Accommodation was provided to the teachers since the beginning of the NEHU. This Clause was also inserted in the Advertisements for teaching posts. However, with the acceptance of GOI'S New Pay revision, the University deleted that clause in subsequent advertisements. The Teachers are not happy with this change, they claim that free hard furnished accommodation is a contractual obligation entered by the University with many teachers before joining this University and that it cannot be withdrawn unilaterally.

The teachers representatively stressed that while filling up posts, the clause ~~is~~^{for} providing free hard furnished accommodation could not be provided to a number of teachers and these had to occupy rented houses in the town. They, therefore, stressed that those rent they are paying be reimbursed in full. Prior to the acceptance of the pay revision, the prescribed rate of HRA admissible to the employees in the rank of Professor (Rs.1500-2500) Reader (Rs.1200-1900/-) and Lecturer (Rs.700/- - 1600/-) respectively is 7½%. However, HRA given to the teachers at that time, as a special case, was @Rs.250/- p.m., Rs.375/- p.m. and Rs.450/-p.m. for Lecturer, Reader and Professor respectively.

This did not mean to re-imburse the full amount of rent paid by the teachers occupying rented accommodation prior to revision of pay. The teachers then pointed out that if re-imburement of full house rent is not possible, the University might agree to pay the HRA at CPWD rates for plinth area allowed by the UGC for Lecturer, Reader and Professor.

In view of the above circumstances since some of the teachers had been enjoying rent-free accommodation provided by the University, it is appropriate that the teachers who cannot be provided with accommodation be considered to allow them HRA at CPWD rate as per the entitled plinth area. I am, therefore, to request the Commission to re-consider the matter and convey their decision at an early date.

Views and comments of the University Legal Adviser as extracted from the file No.F.7-2(2)/Admn-I/91 on Page 23/n.

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(A) The provision of Rent Free and Hard Furnished Accommodation was made available to the teachers (Professors, Lecturers and Readers) who entered the University Service before and this being a contractual obligation it cannot be withdrawn. Teachers who have been joining now are sought to be denied of this facility with the introduction of Govt. of India's New Pay Revision - this policy, it implemented will give rise to two different categories of teachers holding the same post - One set enjoying the benefit of Free furnished accommodation and other set the new entrants without this facility. This is a discrimination which may be struck down in a Court of Law. The plea of Revised Pay Scale by Govt. of India is not tenable in as much as the Pay Scale has been revised in respect of all the teachers both old and new.

(B) Payment of HRA on the basis of plinth area in respect of those teachers who have not been given University accommodation - this is a matter to be settled in consultation with the teachers on the principle that the teachers who could not be accommodated in Free Furnished Univ. Accommodation should also get full reimbursement of the house rent on the basis of their pay scale. The University may also themselves enter into the agreements with the house owners and provide accommodation to the teachers of different categories.

(C) In position of licence fee from teachers who are already there and enjoying rent free accommodation without any charge or payment of any licence fee may be challenge as being against their service condition. Hence such licence fee should not be introduced unilaterally without their consent.

Dear Prof Pakem,

Kindly recollect our telephonic conversation on 12th Oct, 95 regarding grant of study leave/sabbatical leave to Dr R.Sachdeva, Reader & Head of the Department of Linguistics. I would like to recapitulate the case briefly and also decision(s) taken by the Nagaland University.

(1) In April, this year, Dr R.Sachdeva had applied through proper channel for award of a year long fellowship with C.I.I.L, Mysore, Ministry of Human Resource Development and had submitted a project proposal entitled "Towards an Explicit Language Policy in Education for Nagaland". He had been selected for the award and C.I.I.L had sent him the offer in June, this year and sought his acceptance within 15 days, which, following discussion with us, he had conveyed. He had applied for duty leave/study leave for this purpose (a copy of which was sent to you too) and we had felt it was a genuine case of study leave/sabbatical leave and I had personally offered to release him by 30th Sept and placed the decision before the Executive Council for ratification.

(2) After several postponements, the Executive Council finally met on 27th Sept and the matter was placed there. It was felt by the members that since Dr R.Sachdeva had opted to remain with NEHU, his release from Nagaland University could only be conditional and needed approval from your end as well.

(3) Let me convey that Nagaland University has no objection to his being released and we feel that to keep in tact the rights and privileges of NEHU employees on deputation to Nagaland University, we must allow for this to happen. The bond that has to be executed can be done by either of us with an understanding that he will return to serve NEHU in the place of his posting as decided by you.

I, therefore, hope Dr Sachdeva will be released to enable him to take up this assignment and complete the document on language policy in Education for Nagaland. That should be a genuine contribution to our Naga society.
