ON THE RECOGNITION OF RESEARCH LABORATORIES  
AS CENTRES TO GUIDE PH D RESEARCH UNDER THE  
NORTH EASTERN HILL UNIVERSITY.

Under Section 26(1)(1) of the NEHU Act, 1973

2. The recognition of a Scientist as a Ph D Supervisor would be made, taking into consideration the relevant Ordinances, on the basis of a written application through the Head of the Institution where he works, along with bio data and other supporting documents. This application should be made to the Dean of the concerned School. The concerned School Board shall forward the recommended names to the Academic Council, through the concerned Board of Research Studies for its approval.

ORDINANCE OC-4 Clause 3 (1) and (2)

3. (i) The Department shall appoint a supervisor. The supervisor shall be a Professor, Reader or a Lecturer with Ph.D. and with atleast three years experience of research/teaching experience and should be a teacher of this University.
- (2) Provided that the Department may, with the approval of the School Board, appoint one or two joint supervisors in addition to the Supervisor, in which case the Supervisor shall be in overall charge of the supervision. A joint supervisor need not necessarily be a teacher of the University but should be a person recognised as per the University Regulations.

(v) - Repeat chances for Post Graduate students.

As regards to the Repeat chances of P.G. Students, the University has implemented as per the provision of the Ordinance OC-7 : 15 which states that "No candidate will be allowed to appear in any course more than twice and no candidate shall be allowed to appear in any course beyond six semesters of his first admission in to the programme". By the above clause the University has allowed the P.G. students to appear only one exam. as regular and another one exam as Repeat, i.e. the student can repeat only once.

But repeated requests have been received from the students for repeatation of papers/courses twice i.e. 1+1+1 on the plea that the Ordinance provides chances to complete the course within six semesters whereas the existing provision says twice i.e. 1+1.

To avoid any misrepresentation, it was placed before the Advisory Committee on exam matters which then recommended that the provision to repeat may be contained within the sixth semesters, and proposed to be modified as under :-

"A candidate shall be permitted to re-appear/repeat in any of failed papers or for improvement papers below 55% marks in aggregate, within six semesters - irrespective of the number of chances availed of".

Hence, the above recommendation is placed before the Council for its kind decision.

vi) MATTERS RELATING TO GRANTING OF EXAMINATION CENTRE TO AFFILIATED COLLEGES.

In regards to the creation of Examination centres to different colleges, It has been observed in the past that many colleges were given conditional affiliations through C.D.C., where most of the colleges has yet to fulfill the conditions which are major in nature, and it was felt that granting of examination centre (Provisional) to such colleges does not seems proper.

Therefore, the above matter has been placed before the Advisory committee on examination matters, which recommends as follows:

"No examination centre be granted to colleges having conditional affiliation".

Hence, the above recommendations <sup>is</sup> placed before the Council ~~of~~ <sup>is</sup> for <sup>its</sup> kind decision.

vii) SUBMISSION OF DISSERTATION RELATING TO POST GRADUATE COURSES.

In regards to some departments which are having a Dissertation as one of the course/subject, it has occurred that the students are submitting beyond the fourth semester examination with much delay <sup>and has</sup> even affected for the early declaration of their results.

The above matter has thus been placed before the advisory committee on examinations matters, which then recommended as follows:

" Submission of Dissertation in the P.G. Departments, if any, should not stretch beyond the concerned semester"

Hence the above recommendation is placed before the Council for its kind decision.

- ix) Vacational/ Non-vacational of all the Centres in the University.

The EC vide resolution No. EC:33:84:05:3:(i) (Annexure-I) had approved the conversion of the centres for Creative Arts & Adult & Continuing Education as non-vacational vide Notification (Annexure-II). Prof. M.C. Pandey, Head, CSLS, vide letter at (Annexure-III) has submitted that with the restructuring of the Centres vide notification dated 7.9.88 (Annexure IV), Adult & Continuing Education has become an Unit under the centre for supportive learning system with posts of Professors, Reader and Lecturer as academic and vocational. Further, Prof. Pandey, has informed that CSLS is academic in nature with its syllabi duly approved by the different academic bodies and semester system is followed for its PG Diploma and certificate courses. The objective of the respective centres of studies as notified under Ordinance OA-3 and OA-11 and approved by AC and EC, the centres are found to be academic in nature except that the centres do not have regular teaching assignments as in the case of other academic departments, but rather the CSLS is to develop and conduct correspondence course at Ph.D level through distance Education. The contention of Prof. M.C. Pandey that the 33th EC decision treating the centres of Adult & Continuing Education as non-vacational has been superceeded by, in view of the restructuring of the centres and that the faculty members i.e. Prof/Reader/Lecturer be treated as vocational is therefore put up for identifying the centres which are non-vacational.

The matter is place before the AC for decision.

Please refer to your letter mentuoned above, I would like to place the following for your information and necessary action.

Please send a copy of the order informing the CACE that it is non-vacational. In the last 17 years, I have not come across such an order though I have been in Shillong during winter, for several other duties assigned to me. (University co-ordinator refresher courses, co-ordinator faculty interviews, Director CDC etc).

At present there is no CACE, it is CSLS and ACE is a unit under the CSLS. When the restructuring of the Centres was undertaken in 1997, fresh ordinance have been drafted. As per the new ordinance all centres are vacational.

We would also like to know the position of the other Centres, whether they are also non-vacational?

As I understand centres/departments having post of directors, Assistant difectats, project officers, research associates etc. these posts may be academic but non vacational. Centres/departments with the post of professor, reader, lecturers are academic and vacational.

The Centre CSLS is a teaching/academic centre. It organises PG Diploma and Certificate Course. The syllabi are duly approved by the different academic bodies (steering committee, school board, etc) and the final approval is from the AC.

The semester system is followed by the centres.

In the light of the above necessary correction may be made and my earned leave in continuation with the semester break may be regularized.

Grouping of Students during Under-Graduate Practical Examinations.

During the Under-Graduate Moderation Board Meeting in Geography, the said Board had decided that the Practical Examinations, for Honours and General Students may be held for more than 1 day, in other words, the Practical Examinations may be conducted within a span of 3 days for Honours and General Students. The above recommendation was made in view of increasing number of students in the concerned colleges. While recommending so, the Board also felt it necessary that the colleges should make grouping for Honours and General Students depending on the total number of students appearing from the relevant colleges. The Board, therefore, suggested that the grouping should be made in the following manner.

- i) Honours : Maximum of 15 students per-day
- ii) General : Maximum of 20 students per-day

The above recommendations accordingly, were placed before the Advisory Committee, on Examination matters, for perusal. The Advisory Committee, which met on 27th September 2000, considered the suggestions made by the Moderation Board in Geography and resolved that the grouping of 15 students for Honours and a maximum of 25 students for General Course in Geography Practicals may be followed from 2001 Examinations.

In case of other subjects, where Practicals are involved, the Advisory Committee desired that the views may be obtained from the concerned BUGS, for consideration of the Academic Council, including Geography.

In pursuance of the directives from the Advisory Committee, the Examination Department had issued letters to the concerned Chairman of BUGS to express their views on the subject. Till date, the Chairman BUGS in Geography and Botany have responded to the proposal of forming groups during the Under-Graduate Practical Examinations.

The BUGS in Geography, resolved that the grouping of students as suggested resolved implemented on Experimental basis, on the other hand the BUGS in Botany resolved the following:

Grouping of Students During Under-graduate Practical
